EDITORIAL NOTES
[The following were written by the editor in Klamath county and sent in by private carrier early last week, but failed to reach the office till Saturday.]

Nickell figures up the county debt by a different arithmetic from the one he uses when he makes out his bills for advertising.

The Times declares that the people who complain about the county debt are all Republicans. A little inquiry would convince the editor that there are hosts of "Republicans" within the folds of his own party, if this is the test.

All hail the new "official" method of figuring in Jackson county. It lifts every man in the county out of debt completely. If John Doe should owe Charles Nee five thousand dollars, he need only show as assets his yearly income of \$1000 per year for five years and, lo! his creditors must be satisfied. You can't go behind the "exhibit," you see.

If the Times had intended to act as a Republican party paper in the coming campaign it would have waited until after the nominations were made before bringing the true financial condition of the county to the attention of the people. Instead of doing so, it opened the matter long before any primaries, even had been held. This doesn't look like partisanship, does it?

It is a truly edifying spectacle to see the stern patriot Nickell indignant at the "demagogues" displayed by the unscrupulous people who have the temerity to disagree with the method of the "exhibit" of the county finances recently prepared to decide the people pending the election to take place soon. If there is anything Nickell hates, it is wickedness and demagoguery. He never could be legitimized into supporting for office, any man whom he is not entirely sure would be eminently faithful in serving the interests of—Nickell.

The Times is quite certain that "if the exact sum could be ascertained," the county debt would be found to be less than \$70,000. In its computation the \$36,000 assets mentioned by the clerk are deducted from the total amount of outstanding scrip. The Times follows the method of the clerk in figuring in as assets future income which will all be needed to meet the running expenses of the county. If the Times keeps on insisting that this is true "Democratic" financing it will find itself with a very small minority of its party at its back when the question comes to a practical issue.

The Times says the clerk is a "sworn officer," and therefore his "exhibit" must be correct. That settles it. It is very wrong for any one not a "sworn officer" to make any criticisms upon the "exhibit." If a "sworn officer" ignores the little matter of \$10,000 to \$15,000 interest, let no one else dare mention it. If a "sworn officer" says the increase of the debt during six months past is about one thousand dollars, any man who takes the clerk's own figures in the remarkable "exhibit" and finds it to be ten times as much, should be—well, he should be called a "Republican," anyhow. If a "sworn officer" considers it an evidence of financial sagacity to figure as "assets" the prospective income of the county and to leave out of his calculations entirely the prospective expenses, let no one be so bold as to take issue with his methods, on pain of being called a "Republican."

Week before last the Times said the campaign lies about the county debt were all explicated by the "exhibit" of the county clerk, which should settle the matter, and ease the mind of every taxpayer. Last week the Times editor himself considered it necessary to say upon his own editorial responsibility (a great and astonishing piece of boldness for him) that some \$25,000 or \$70,000 is "about the exact figure" of the county debt. This doesn't quite agree with the county clerk's exhibit, for the Times acknowledges that there is such a thing as "accrued interest," while the county clerk didn't appear to have heard anything about that. The two are near enough together, however, for campaign purposes, and when we are assured both by a "sworn officer" and by the truth-loving Nickell that the debt is not over a mere, paltry \$70,000, who can doubt it?

Value of the Sunflower.
[From Home Gardener.]

It is the best egg producing food known for poultry, keeping them in a thriving condition and largely increasing the production of eggs. Every poultry raiser who tries it will find that this seed is the best food known for glossing the plumage of fowls, and is almost indispensable to those who want to exhibit their birds for exhibition to the best advantage. The Russian sunflower is easily raised, requires very little care, can be grown in fence corners or other places difficult to cultivate. Its production of seed is immense, yielding often at the rate of one hundred bushels to the acre. It should be planted in hills four feet apart, any time from the 10th of May to the first of July. Three quarts of seed will plant an acre.
