### Eye Disease in Cattle.

A disease called "white-eye" seems to be general among the cows about town, and is also reported as having appeared elsewhere in the valley. It is somewhat similar to pinkeye in horses. The eye becomes swollen and sore, and soon the entire eyeball is covered with a white film, which, of course, obscures the sight. Supdays the disease passes away, leaving, so far as known, no permanent evil effects. Sometimes only one, and sometimes both eyes are affected and the animal becomes temporarily stone blind. For treatment various eve-washes are used, and some stock owners apply dry salt, powdered Lodge I. O. G. T. of Oregon. burnt alum and honey to the eyes.
