Sufficient funds have been secured to complete the survey, and it is hoped to have the surveys in the field within ten days.

Mr. D. C. Ireland has commenced the publication of a daily paper at McMinnville, which he sends out for 10 cents a week and \$1.25 per quarter by mail. He says that this is to supply a "long felt want."

The Santa Monica, Cal. Ware ranches for the truth of a story that a resident of that place recently opened a water tank on the dinner table, whereupon a large and lively rattlesnake issued thence, to the great consternation of the diners.

The people of Ventura, Cal. are going to try a novel experiment in sprinkling the streets with crude petroleum instead of water.

It is thought that oil, after two or three sprinklings will be used for months. The experiment is looked for with much interest.

Union county has commenced suit against the Pine creek road commissioners for \$700 and to restrain them from paying out \$300 to the contractors, the county claiming that the road has not been built according to contract. Much feeling is caused by this action.

W. W. Piper, a man of 50 years of age who was on his way from Portland, Oregon, to Ohio, after exhibiting signs of insanity, finally rushed to the platform and jumped from the train near Mornington, Ore., Wednesday morning.

He was rescued by the train crew, and taken to the hospital, where he died on the 10th inst. from the injuries received.

The Canyon City stage was robbed by two highway men near Thursday's station about 10 o'clock on Thursday morning of last week. They took Wells, Fargo & Co.'s treasure box, \$1500 from a Chinaman, and about \$200 from the other passengers. The treasure box is supposed to have contained a large amount of gold dust. The sheriff and posse are after the robbers.

Jack Powers, a life prisoner at Salem, was pardoned on Monday by Gov. Moody, on the recommendation of the board of pardons.

For a long time a petition has been in circulation in Portland and Washington county, signed by some of the best people, begging for his release. On the 4th of July, 1881, Powers shot and killed Ben Cornelius, brother of Hon. Thomas Cornelius, the former his father-in-law, opposite the Esmond house.

On Thursday of last week, near Corvallis, a man named McClellan struck a 12-year old son of John Eckhard with a pitchfork, and stabbed and beat him in such a horrible manner that it is thought that the boy cannot recover. The particulars, as near as can be obtained, are as follows: That McClellan, a hired hand of Mr. Eckhard's, was engaged in hauling straw with the boy, when he began to tease and make fun of McClellan. The latter flew into a passion at the boy and struck him over the head several times with the handle of the pitchfork he was using, and stabbing him in the back three times with the tines of the fork.
