SYRACUSE'S SAPPHO.

The Woman Who Wants to Be an American Poet Laureate and President.

Syracuse has an aspirant for the position of poet laureate of America But, being a loyal member of the Union, she does not wish to be called by a title as suggestive of the effete monarchies as "poet laureate" and has therefore declared in favor of "national poetess." She is Mrs. Sarah Ulricht Kelley, and she modestly describes herself as hymn writer and prospective national poetess of the United States, nominated by a very large majority of editors.

Mrs. Kelley is a remarkable woman. She proposes not only to be national poetess, but president as well. She intends to sing herself into glory, dominion and power. As poetess laureate of these great United States it will be but a step to the presidential chair, for by the act which congress must adopt her salary will exceed that of the chief justice of the supreme bench and will be inferior only to that of the president himself. Concerning this vital feature of her set plan, Mrs. Kelley said: "If I were national poet, I should give all my salary away. I will leave the question of compensation to congress, but I want it fixed at \$12,000 a year."

Mrs. Kelley has liberal notions as to the treatment of men when she is president. Her cabinet, she says, will not be composed entirely of men or women, but there will be a fair and equitable compromise. She thinks that Susan B. Anthony's great mistake lies in her attitude toward men.

An example of Mrs. Kelley's poetry, called "Syracuse In a Rainy Day," has some gems of thought. She says, referring to a war claim which she has against the government:

I hope dear congress kindly pays me my just For what he spent for comrades when he gained hero's fame. I trust the Fifty-third will appoint me laureate.



LAST USE OF ARMOR.

It Was In 1799 and Was a Picturesque and Diabolical Scene.

In January, 1799, at the town of Aquilla, in the Abruzzo, then held by a garrison of 400 French troops, the peasants broke into the town, and, though they were driven out by the French, they continued to give serious trouble. They even drove the French into the fort and made ready to bombard them with heavy guns. The French

were in an awkward position. Boulert, the officer of artillery, ransacking his brains for the means of sending out men to spike the guns on the glacis, under the fire of the insurgents from the neighboring houses, suddenly remembered that he had seen in his magazine some suits of plate armor, and he proposed to try whether, protected by them, men could not sally out and work in security under the musketry fire. He got together 12 complete suits and dressed out 12 gunners and grenadiers thus, selecting big men, be it remarked. At a certain hour the garrison lined the covered way, and from thence and from the fort opened a steady fire of musketry and of artillery on the lines of the insurgents.

Then out marched the 12 knights of the eighteenth century, much in David's state of mind when he complained he had not proved his armor. The men carried handspikes, hammers and spikes. Moving naturally slowly and awkwardly in their heavy steel mail, still they succeeded in completing their work | to the condition of a subjugated province under a hail of bullets from the insurgents. The scene is described, as we can well believe, to have been most remarkable and to have had something picturesque and also diabolical about it.

A STICK OF LICORICE.

Where the Plant Grows and How It Is Prepared For Consumption.

Black licorice is made from the juice of the licorice plant, mixed with starch to prevent it from melting in hot weather. The licorice plant grows for the most part on the banks of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers, which flow through immense treeless prairies of un-cultivated land. The climate of these great plains is variable. Half the year it is mild and pleasant, but for three months it is very cold, and for three months in summer hot winds sweep across the country, raising the temperature to 104 degrees for weeks at a time.

The licorice plant is a shrub three feet high and grows without cultivation in situations where its roots can reach the water. The usual time of collecting is the winter, but roots are dug all the year round. At first the root is full of water and must be allowed to dry, a process which takes nearly a year. It is then cut into small pieces, from six inches to a foot long. The good and sound pieces are kept, and the rotten ones are used for firewood. The licorice is then taken in native river boats of Bassora, whence it is shipped in pressed bales to London.

As the valley of the Euphrates contained one of the earliest civilizations in the world, it is probable that licorice is about the oldest confection extant, and that the taste, which pleases nearly all children today, was familiar to the little brown boys and girls of Babylon and Nineyeh 3,000 years ago -Pittsburg Dispatch.
