AS A STUMP SPEAKER.

Lincoln's Famous Oration In Cooper Union, New York.

Mr. Lincoln was the only man who ever went directly from the stump to the presidency and was, in fact, the only man ever chosen to that office who did not at the time of such choice or within a very near period of time hold public office or stand conspicuous before the nation for military achievement.

Mr. Lincoln was nominated for the presidency within a few weeks after he had finished the last and one of the most important stumping tours which he ever made. It is one about which less has been written than has been told of any of his other experiences upon the hustings, and yet it was one which had almost as important influence in reconciling the leading men of his party to his nomination as even that more conspicuous and brilliant succession of debates which he held two years before with Stephen A. Douglas.

It was doubtless with a view of revealing to the able men of the east that Mr. Lincoln was as logical, lucid, terse, impressive and cultivated an orator as

any man that the east possessed that the suggestion was delicately conveyed to consent to deliver an address in New York city. If there was no great belief on the part of these able eastern Republicans in Mr. Lincoln's higher intellecoverthrown Douglas, and who had crystallized public opinion in the west.

The congregation that assembled in Cooper Union on that now historic evening was a splendid one. Many of the distinguished Republicans brought their wives or members of their families. Evarts was there, curious to see and hear this man of whom he had heard so much, but for whom he had not at that time the most admiring opinion, perhaps because of premonitions that it was Lincoln who was to defeat the darling hope of Evarts and of that great company of eastern Republicans who had cherished for four years the desire to see Mr. Seward nominated for the presidency. Governor Morgan was there, and Moses H. Grinnell, who might have been governor had his partner not objected, and young Colonel Arthur, who was afterward to be president, and Professor Dwight, one of the profoundest lawyers New York has ever had, and William Cullen Bryant, even then seeming venerable in appearance, and, in fact, nearly all of those men who had been conspicuous in the service of the young Re-

publican party in New York city. Mr. Lincoln was introduced, and very happily, by William Cullen Bryant, and when he stepped forth upon the platform a great throng saw a man conspicuous above every other one in that hall for height, with a sort of awkward grace suggested by his loose jointed figure, a careless indifference to nicety in his dress, his face clean shaven, homely and his hair tossed about his head seemingly as though his fingers had been run carelessly through it just before he arose. His appearance for the moment was not such as to greatly impress those who saw him. He spoke in a voice pitched upon a high tenor key, but it was noticed that his words were distinctly enunciated, and his voice carried easily

over that hall. His first sentence surprised the accomplished orators and thinkers who were before him. They expected to hear a flowery, rhetorical and showy exordium, but there was no exordium at all. He plunged immediately into his subject, taking as his text a paragraph from a speech delivered a few months before by Douglas in Ohio. Before he had spoken five minutes these able men perceived his intellectual strength and began to understand why he had gained the pre-eminence which distinguished of rhetoric in the address, but it was noticed that the diction was singularly

Queen Lil. Resigns.

Steamer Australia brings advices from Honolulu dated January 30, stating that ex-Queen Liliuokalani of the late kingdom of Hawaii, has voluntarily abdicated in favor of the republic.

She says she takes this step partly for the sake of the misguided Hawaiians, who recently engaged in rebellion against the republic in an attempt to restore her to the throne. She disclaims any desire to avoid punishment by this declaration but she asks executive clemency for the rebels and says she wants to live in absoute privacy hereafter.

> It is essential that the location notice filed for record shall, in addition to the foregoing description, state whether the entire claim of 1500 feet is taken on one side of the point of discovery, or whether it is partly on one side and partly on the other side; and in the latter case how many feet are claimed upon each side of the discovery point. It is important that great care be taken in making, describing and marking mining claims in the notice of location for record. An application for mining claim survey may be declined by the mineral deputy surveyor where the location is not properly marked on the ground and recorded; and when he makes such survey he must give in his field notes the bearings and distances of his corners to those cited in the location notice, and the same must be shown on the official plat of the survey to enable the department to determine the legal propriety of the survey. The provisions of the law must be strictly complied with in each case to entitle the claimant to a survey and a patent. In all cases, if the location was properly made, it was marked upon the ground. If the survey of it was properly executed, it must have been within the limits thus marked, an lifthe marks of the location and those of the survey are identical the facts must appear stated in the official field notes .- [Mining and Scientific Press.

The "Quadrant" Case.

The United States circuit court of appeals rendered a decision at San Francisco last week in the case of the Oregon & California Railroad company and the Oregon Central Railroad company against the United States in favor of the railroad companies. The case involves 300,000 acres of land in the vicinity of Forest steal the floral decorations. Ushers and Grove, Oregon, valued at \$1,000,000. It the police had their hands full, trying to has long been known as "the quadrant maintain order. Some even pilfered from case." The action was originally brought by the United States to enjoin the companies from asserting title to the lands in mantle and only surrendered it when question, which had been forfeited by an

act of congress in 1885. In 1870 congress granted certain lands to the companies to aid in the construction of a railroad from Portland to Astoria and from the junction near Forest Grove to a point near McMinnville. By the terms of the grant the companies were to be given a tract of twenty miles on each side of the completed road and patents were to be given by the secretary of the interior as soon as the line was completed in sections of 20 miles.

The United States contended that there were two roads, one from Portland to Astoria, and one from Forest Grove to McMinuville; that the first was not complete and that the lands in the quadrant at Forest Grove were not earned. The companies contended that there was but one continuous road from Portland to Astoria and McMinnville, and that the construction of the road from Portland to McMinnville entitled them to the

The court took the view that there was but one road intended as evidenced by the use of the singular noun "road" in the original grant, and in the forfeiture act of 1885. The court decided that the company had earned the lands. The case was therefore reversed, and sent Careless marking of the boundaries of back to Circuit Judge Bellinger of Oregon for further action.
