There will be no speeches, but the contestants will face each other sitting, and when one affirms a proposition the other will cross-examine him by questions, all to be taken down by a stenographer and published daily in the papers and afterward put in book form for general distribution at cost.

Like Rats in a Barrel.

San Francisco, June 13.-Robert Gonzales, a mess boy of the lost Colima, who arrived here this morning on the Colon, in company with Fred Johnson, a sailor, gives a vivid discription of the fight for life made by the helpless women and children when the ship went down. "When the boat began to rock and roll, the passengers in the steerage did not seem to think much was the matter. The rolling of the ship became more violent, and after a while the boatswain came to the companion way and told us to get out. Even then the passengers did not seem to understand that any thing was serious and went out slowly. I saw two or three of them go to the companionway and come back, but I did not know why, at that time. As the boat continued to roll, and the water began pouring in, I ran to the ladder leading to the deck and started to go up. After I had reached the middle of the ladder, I saw why the others had come back. They could not get out. The lumber and other stuff are the deck had shifted to such an axis. on the deck had shifted to such an extent that the companion way hatch was covered up. They were like rats in a barrel. They could not get out and had to wait there until the water came in on them. Being familiar with the ship, I ran through the kitchen and crawled up the dummy waiter to the pantry above. The interest taken in the proposed improvement of the wagon road between Ashland and Klamath Falls by the people of Klamath county is pretty well indicated by the stand taken by the local papers there in their last issues. The idea is to make a good road from Ashland, the closest town of any impor-tance on the railroad, to Klamath Falls. This is a very important and necessary improvement. We are badly in need of a good wagon road, the one now in opperation is a disgrace, and there is no doubt but that it retards the growth of our town and county. Our trade aimost entirely goes to Siskiyou county. What in return do we receive from Siskiyou county? While this matter is being urged at Ashland, and among the people of the valley, the people of Klamath county and vicinity should give this subject their attention. It is stated by parties in our town who are familiar with the topography of the country lying between the Klamath basin and Ashland, that the gradients of the old road can be much improved, and a first class road built and maintained.

The Star man, who has heretofore spoken lightly of the effort of Rogue river valley people to improve the road from here to Klamath, has "taken a hitch in his pants" and has fallen into line, giving approval to the scheme as follows:

"There are many reasons why this road should be built, prominent among which might be mentioned the fact that it will materially increase commercial relations between the people of this and adjoining counties, and the entire Rogue river val-ley. And Ashland being the nearest

railroad point of any prominence to this, it is especially desirable that we have a means of connecting with the R. R. at that place. The actual distance from here to Ashland over the present traveled route, as measured by cyclometer, is only about nine miles greater than to Ager, and it is asserted by old residents familiar with the route, that a relocation will shorten the road several miles, besides materially lessening the grades. It is already laid out, established and built from here to Chase's which can be utilized, covers fully one-half that distance So that this county will have not to- exceed seventeen miles of road additional to maintain, to carry out our part of this grand enterprise. This seems to be the time to act, and we confidently expect to see this road built."
