Interesting Railroad Statistics. The seventh statistical report of the interstate commerce commission for the year ending June 30, 1894, has just been submitted. In the introduction special attention is called to the peculiar conditions affecting the operations of railways. First, the report covers the last four months of the Columbian exposition, during which time there was an increased passenger traffic. Second, it covers a period of widespread and nuprecedented business depression. Thus, June 30, 1894, 192 roads, operating upwards of 42,000 miles of line, and representing about one-fourth of the total railway capitalization, were in the hands of receivers. The effect of these conditions is apparent in nearly all the figures pre-

The total mileage in the United States June 30, 1894, was 178,708, an increase during the year of 2247 miles. The increase during the previous year was 4897. The percentage of increase during 1894 was less than that for any preceding year for which reports have been made to the commission, and it is not probable that the year ending June 30, 1895, will show much improvement. The number of roads abandoned was 16. The total mile-

age of all tracks was 233,533 miles. The total number of railroad corporations was 1924, an increase during the year of 22. The number of railroads not in operation was 77. The movement of consolidation during the year, on the basis of mileage, involved, has been greater than in the previous four years. Fifteen roads, representing 1734 miles, have been merged; 22 roads, representing 2352 miles, have been reorganized, and 14 roads, representing 1590 miles, have been consolidated. A classification of railways on the basis of operated mileage shows that 44 roads, each with a mileage of over 1000 miles, operate 100,547 miles of line, or 56.30 per cent of the total mileage of the country. Ninety roads operate 72 90 per cent of the entire mileage.

The total number of locomotives was 35,302, an increase during the year of 704, and the total number of cars 1,278.078. The increase in the number of cars during the year was 4132.

The total number of railway employes was 779,608, a decrease as compared with the number June 30, 1893, of 93,994, or 10.76 per cent. This is a smaller number employed than any year since 1890. This decrease is due the report states, to the heavy falling off in traffic and the endeavor of the railways to economize.

63.43 per cent of the total amount. The total of dividends was \$95.575.976, or an average rate on the dividend-paying stock of 5.41 per cent. The amount of bonds paying no interest was \$650,573,786. The mount of miscellaneous obligations paying no interest was \$53,426,264, and the amount of income bonds paying no inter-

est was \$210,757,554. The number of passengers carried was 619,688,189, an increase over the previous year of 26,127,587, and was occasioned by the world's fair travel. There was a large decrease in the freight traffic, the tons carried being 636,186,553, as against 745,-119,482 in 1893.

The gross earnings of the railways for the year were \$1,073,361,797, a decrease as compared with the previous year of \$147, 390.077. Passenger revenues decreased \$16,142,258, and the revenue from freight traffic decreased \$129,562,948. The amount of operating expenses was \$731,-414,322, a decrease of \$96,506,977. The net earnings were \$341,947,475, a decrease of \$50,883,100 as compared with the previous year. The income derived from sources outside of operations was \$142,-816,805. The amount of fixed charges and other deductions from income was \$429,008,310, leaving a net income of \$55,755,970 available for dividends, and a dese as compared with the previous year of nearly 50 per cent. The amount of dividends paid was \$95,575,976, a decrease of only \$5,353,907 from the amount paid the previous year. The revenue derived from the carrying of passengers was

\$284,349,558, and the revenue derived from freight traffic was \$699,490,913. During the year 1923 railway employes were killed and 23,422 were injured, as compared with 2727 killed and 30,179 injured in 1893. This marked decrease in casualty is partly due, the report says, to the decrease in the number of men employed, and the decrease in the volume of siness handled. The increase in the United States of automatic appliances on railway equipment also may have rendered railway employment less danger ous. The number of passengers killed was 324, an increase of 25, and the number injured was 3304, a decrease of 195. To show the ratio of casualty, it may be stated that one employe was killed out of every 428 in the service, and one injured

They will pay for a money order to transmit the pay and then pay postage for return at the rate of one cent an ounce. often amounting to more than the difference they pay to the local dealer. But something from abroad, in the eyes of many, is better than from a local store.

This sending abroad for any article of use, that you can buy at home, is not right. You are practically boycotting your neighbor. That is unjust. In building up a community, town or city and the country around it, each are mutually dependent, the one upon the other. The country is dependent upon the townpeople as consumers of their products.

The more the town is built up and its population increased, the more extensive is the consumption of raral products; and the more certainty of a market. Besides, a part of the money you pay to your local traders is kept at home and goes into circulation and you have an equal chance to share it with others; whereas every dollar you send abroad is gone from you forever. It goes to increase the profits of the wealthy merchant in big cities

-the millionaires of Chicago, Philadelphia, New York or Boston. Then you will sit up nights concocting some form of speech anathematising the millionaires and the government for class legislation in the interest of the rich, when in fact, you yourself have abused your privileges -which the law guarantees to you-by contributing to that end. You have helped make those millionaires by extending your aid to them instead of, as you ought, trying to scatter it by a more equal distribution of it.
