Curiosity Causes Her Death.

Mrs. Nettie Way, whose husband Ed. Way has been employed by the Cooke Lumber Co. at the logging camp and who resides about 4 miles from the camp on the Klamath river, died last Tuesday by accidentally taking a dose of strychnine. There was a bottle of the poison about the house which she was not aware of and discovering it, was curious to know what it was. She put it to her tongue and swallowed some of it. Her husband who was out at the time, returning to the house immediately afterward, she informed him what she had done to his consternation and horror. There was no medical aid to be summoned within several miles of that mountain home and no neighbors near by. Neither man nor wife appeared to be familiar with any remedy. She was soon in convulsions and died shortly the horrible death which ensues in all cases of stricknine poisoning. The only persons present were her husband, her little child less than a year old and an adopted boy about 10 years of age. The couple lived happily. Way bears a good character among the employees about the logging camp and there is said to be no thought of suicide or foul play in the minds of friends and relatives.
