WHEREAS, the Military State Board of the State of Oregon have selected the City of Ashland as a proper site for such building and propose to construct the same here that shall cost the sum of \$30,000.00, provided, one-half that amount shall be raised by said city or by Jackson County, or by the co-operation of said city and county, and

WHEREAS, the Hon. County Court of said County of Jackson did on the 2d day of Feb., 1911 make an order appropriating the sum of \$7,500.00 for said purpose, provided, the City of Ashland shall appropriate a like sum therefor, and WHEREAS, the construction of

such a building in the City of Ashland is of great importance, now

#### THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1.

That the proposition of the Military Board of the State of Oregon to construct an Armory Building in the City of Ashland that shall cost not less than \$30,000.00 including the cost of the ground, is hereby accepted under the terms of the law providing therefor, as expressed in the Act of the Legislative Assembly, filed in the office of the Secretary of State Feb. 24th, 1909. SECTION 2.
