TAFT VICTOR

SEVENTY-TWO DELEGATES FOR PRESIDENT.

ROOSEVELT HAS NONE THUS FAR

Real Issues Come This Week When Cases Like Indiana Come Up-More Stress Laid Upon Northern

Chicago, June 10 .- Twenty-four delegates from Alabama and Arkanas were added to the Taft column Friday by action of the republican national committee upon the socalled Roosevelt contests from those Forty-eight more took the ame route Saturday by decisions tpon contests from Arkansas, Florida and Georgia. This brings the total in the two days' session up to 72, while none have been added to the Roosevilt list.

Ten of the Georgia districts-20 delegates-went to Taft in a blanket decision, both sides agreeing to their being decided upon the same arguments. Four delegates-at-large from the state also were given to Taft, together with two remaining districts

with two delegates apiece. Sixteen delegates from Alabama and eight from Arkansas were given to Taft, in addition to the Georgia delegates. So far every Taft delegate who has been up for hearing has been placed upon the convention temporary roll and in almost every case this has been done with Roosevelt
