The Yreka Journal states the case as follows:

'The Siskiyou county supervisors have established a record that will go down in history viz .: That they passed an order that if the state highway passed through Dunsmuir up the canyon and then to Coles, they would build all bridges and give then an 80-foot right of way. The state commission claims that by Siskiyou making this offer it has raised the building fund \$6,000,000, as other counties have had to make the same offer. It virtually means that they will have \$24,000,000 to work on. It is understood that the reason the engineers contemplate the building of the road up the Pitt and Mc-Cloud rivers is on account of the saving of about \$50,000, but a little saving like that is nothing compared with the accommodation of thousands of people who visit the noted summer resorts of Siskiyou, many of which are located in the canyon, besides being the most direct route."
