### AGAINST MOVIES TRUST MAKES FIRST APPEAL

**United States to Bring Suit to Compel Refund to Picture House Owners.**

Chicago, Nov. 30.—Suit similar to that brought against the "bathtub trust" is soon to be tried against the "moving picture trust" in Philadelphia. Joseph R. Darling, special agent of the department of justice, and Edwin P. Grosvenor, assistant attorney general, have been in Chicago interviewing independent picture theatre owners for the last week.

Darling said that this newest business combination has grown to mammoth proportions, and that it represents an investment of between \$100,000,000 and \$120,000,000. Darling said:

"It maintains control of the moving picture business through a pool of its patents on machines and film processes. We believe we will be able to force a refund of \$10,000,000 to picture house owners, which we contend has been illegally collected in license fees.

**WILL SUE PEARY.**

**Well-Known Arctic Explorers to Clash in Court.**

Portland, Ore., Nov. 30.—Dr. Frederick Cook, Arctic explorer and discredited after claiming to have located the north pole, who is here today, stated that he is to institute proceedings against Admiral Robert E. Peary in the federal courts at the earliest possible date to prove that Peary defamed his character and also that he was as near to the pole as Peary.

Dr. Cook declared in an interview that he is in the northwest primarily to gather evidence against Edward Barrill of Tacoma, who was his guide in the Mount McKinley trip. He makes the positive statement that Barrill was bribed to the extent of \$2,500 to discredit him and claims to know the Tacoma bank and the name of the banker negotiating the alleged bribe.

**Marshfield Invokes Aid of Railroad Commission Against Water Company.**

Salem, Ore., Dec. 2.—Alleging that the water supply of the Coos Bay Water Company is inadequate and that the water furnished is unfit for human consumption, the city of Marshfield today filed a complaint against the company with the railroad commission. This is the first complaint to be filed under the public utility law passed by the people at the recent election. The city, in brief, alleges that the water is unfit for domestic purposes, that the mains are worn out, and that there is not an adequate supply for fire protection.
