### A New Business Law

Chapter 154, Page 270, Oregon Laws, 1913.

Regulating Persons Doing Business Under an Assumed Name.

"No person or persons shall hereafter carry on, conduct or transact business in this state under any assumed name or under any designation, name or style, corporate or otherwise, other than the real and true name or names of the person or persons conducting such business or having an interest therein."

The law in brief is: Such person or persons shall file a certificate in the county clerk's office in the county in which said business is conducted, with the names of all interested persons in said business and their postoffice address.

All persons now conducting any business, as is stated above, shall file and have recorded and indexed in a book kept for that purpose a certificate, as above required, within 30 days after this act shall take effect. (Law became effective June 3.)

Non-compliance with this law will prevent and debar any person or persons conducting, carrying on or transacting business as aforesaid from maintaining any suit or action in any courts of this

"Any person violating any provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100."
