A representative of the Tidings had the pleasure a few days ago of visiting the home orchard of the Talent Orchard Company and inspecting the place, which is one of the big propositions of the Rogue River Valley.

The Talent Orchard Company has 312 acres of land largely in fruit, one of the principal units being the famous Pellett orchard of 15 acres of Newtowns, one tree of which in 1910 produced 67 packed boxes of apples of the highest grade.

In addition to the large home orchard they have the "Gold Range orchard near Medford and 11 acres of Spitz apples on the Pacific Highway right in Talent.

The feature which most interested the writer was the determination of Mr. Thomas to eliminate the matter of waste so far as possible in the orchard business.
