Medford Prohibition Meeting.

Ashland was represented at the statewide prohibition meeting at Medford last Thursday evening by Mayor Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. Childs, Mr. and Mrs. Rodgers and Mrs. Ashcraft. F. W. Emerson of Eugene delivered the principal address, taking as his topic "To Whom Shall We Go?" Mr. Emerson is but recently from California, where he took an active part in public affairs, being the prohibition candidate for governor several years ago. He is a forceful speaker and made his points clear and distinct. County officers were elected for the year and a fine musical program rendered. Mayor Johnson was called upon for a few remarks and responded in a short address. The meeting was a decided success and the prohibitions feel that the county campaign is progressing very satisfactorily.
