**Medford to Have Athletic Field**

Mail Tribune: At a meeting of the parents and teachers Friday afternoon a resolution was adopted asking that a number of lots, located on South Oakdale, belonging to the school board, be graded and made into an athletic field for the benefit of the local schools. Dr. E. R. Seeley was instructed to confer with City Engineer Olin Arnsperger regarding the work, which is to be started April 11. A team will be hired and the work will be done exclusively by the school boys. A large fence is to be built around the field.
