Mr. Daniel Toole's Lecture on Man's Final Destiny

The lecture Sunday afternoon in the armory was well attended. Mr. Toole spoke on "The Destiny of Man." He handles his subject in a very pleasing manner and is firm in his conviction that the destiny of man is thoroughly outlined in the Scriptures.

In summing up his arguments Mr. Toole said:

Man Is a Convict.

Adam and Eve went forth from Eden convicts, under sentence of death. The convicts esteemed it a mercy to be let die gradually rather than suddenly; while to the Creator and Judge this was expedient because of His plan for their future, in which such experience with imperfect conditions would be of great value.

The death penalty, inflicted in this manner, God foresaw would, through experience, furnish man such a lesson on the exceeding sinfulness of sin and its baneful results as would never need to be repeated—a lesson, therefore, which would profit all who learn it to all eternity; especially when Christ's Messianic reign of righteousness shall manifest in contrast the fruits of righteousness. God also designed that the exercise of man's mental faculties in coping with the disturbances and imperfections of his surroundings, and in inventing remedies, and the exercise of his moral faculties in combating his own weaknesses, and the calls upon his sympathy, should prove beneficial.

When it is seen that the Scriptures teach that death and not life in torment is the penalty pronounced and inflicted, all is reasonable. The God-dishonoring doctrine of hell-fire is not found in the Bible; it is a relic of the Dark Ages. God Has a Right.

God has a right to demand perfect obedience from His perfect creature when placed under perfect conditions, as in Adam's case. And the decree that none shall live everlastingly except the perfect, is both a wise and a just provision for the everlasting welfare of all God's creatures.

There is a depth of meaning in the Creator's words, as He sent forth His fairly tried and justly condemned creatures. He said, "Cursed is the ground for thy sake;" i. e., The earth in general is in its present imperfect condition for your profit and experience, even though you may not esteem it so. Adam would have sought to retain continual access to the garden fruits in order to avoid severe labor and to enable him to fully sustain his vital powers and live forever; but in loving consideration for man's ultimate good, no less than in justice, and in respect for His own sentence of death, God prevented this and guarded the way back to the Garden, in order that the death sentence should not fall of execution.

The children of the condemned pair inherited their fall, imperfections and weaknesses, and also the penalties of these; for "who can bring a clean thing out of an unclean?" The whole race, therefore, as convict laborers, have not only been learning what sin and evil are, and their undesirable results, but by their labor and skill they are serving to prepare the earth and bring it as a whole to the full perfection designed for it, and illustrated in the condition of Eden.

God Just, Yet the Justifier of Sinners.

St. Paul tells us that God adopted a method for the recovery of man from that original sentence of death that came upon all as the result of Adam's fall, which would show the justice of His sentence and the unchangeableness of His decrees, and yet permit such as are sick of sin to use their experience wisely, and to return to harmony with and obedience to their Creator and His just and reasonable laws and regulations. In brief, this plan provided that another Man who, by obedience to the law of God, should prove His worthiness of eternal life, might, by the willing sacrifice of the life to which He was thus proved worthy, redeem

the forfeited life of Adam and of his posterity who lost life through him; for it is written, "In Adam all die," and "By the offence of one, sentence of condemnation came on all men."—1 Cor. 15:22; Rom. 5:12, 18.

God purposed the selection of the Church before the blessing of resurrection should go to the world. This Church is called sometimes "the Body of Christ, which is the Church," of which Jesus is the Head. Again it is styled "the Bride—the Lamb's Wife." Ever since Pentecost the Heavenly Father has been drawing believers to Jesus' side. After justifying them through faith in the precious blood, they have been invited to become Jesus' disciples. His followers, to walk in His steps, to lay down their lives in the Father's service, as Jesus did, and to develop in their hearts the fruits and graces of the Holy Spirit to such a degree that they might be called "Copies of God's dear Son."

Then will come the holy, invisible Messianic Kingdom and the binding of Satan and the destruction of his unholy, invisible kingdom, and the setting loose of agencies for the enlightening and uplifting of the whole race.

New Precinct Lines For May Primary

The voting precinct lines have been materially changed since the last election and voters should inform themselves as to these changes. In order that no mistakes may be made, the Tidings is printing below the complete description of the new precincts as they will be mapped out for the primary on May 15:

South Ashland Precinct—Voting place, dwelling corner Iowa and Boulevard.

Beginning at the intersection of the middle line of B street and Morse avenue, in the City of Ashland.

Thence east along the middle line of B street to its intersection with the middle line of Mountain avenue.

Thence south along the middle line of Mountain avenue to its intersection with the middle line of East Main street.

Thence easterly along the middle line of East Main street and its continuation as a county road to its intersection with the middle line of the county road which crosses in a southeasterly direction the NW 1/4 of sec. 13, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence easterly on north line of sec. 13, said twp. and range, to the northeast corner of said sec. 13.

Thence south to the southeast corner of sec. 36, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence west on twp. line to its intersection with Ashland creek on south line of SE 1/4 sec. 32, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence meander northerly along Ashland creek to the N. and W. 1/4 line, sec. 16, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence east on said 1/4 line to the middle line of Elkader street.

Thence north along the middle line of Elkader street to the middle line of Glenn street.

Thence west along the middle line of Glenn street to its intersection with the middle line of Mountain avenue.

Thence north along the middle line of Mountain avenue to its intersection with the middle line of Ashland street.

Thence west along the middle line of Ashland street to its intersection with the middle line of Beach street.

Thence northerly along the middle line of Beach street and Morse avenue to the place of beginning.

Ashland Boulevard Precinct—Voting place, East Side school.

Beginning at the intersection of the middle line of B street with Fifth street, in the City of Ashland.

Thence easterly and southeasterly along the middle line of B street to its intersection with the middle line of Morse avenue.

Thence southerly along the middle line of Morse avenue to its intersection with the middle line of Beach street.

Thence south along the middle line of Beach street to its intersection with the middle line of Ashland street.

Thence east along the middle line of Ashland street to Mountain avenue.

Thence south along the middle line of Mountain avenue to its intersection with the middle line of Glenn street.

Thence east along the middle line of Glenn street to the middle line of Elkader street.

Thence south along the middle line of Elkader street to the 1/4 corner on the east line of sec. 16, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence west on south line of NE 1/4 of said sec. 16 to SW corner of said NE 1/4 thereof.

Thence north to the 1/4 corner on north line of sec. 16, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M., same being Ash street.

Thence west along the center line of Ash street to the middle line of Guthrie street.

Thence north along the middle line of Guthrie street to the middle line of Montana avenue.

Thence east along the middle line of Montana avenue to the middle line of Gresham street.

Thence north along the middle line of Gresham street to the middle line of Main street.

Thence southeasterly along the middle line of Main street to the middle line of Fifth street.

Thence northeasterly along the middle line of Fifth street to the place of beginning.

East Ashland Precinct—Voting place, Fourth street fire station.

Beginning where Bear creek intersects the Willamette Meridian at a point near the southwest corner of sec. 30, twp. 38 S., R. 1 E., W. M., thence north to northwest corner of sec. 30, twp. 38 S., R. 1 E., W. M., thence east 1/2 mile, thence north 2 miles, thence west 1/2 mile, thence north 2 miles to northwest corner twp. 38 S., R. 1 E., W. M., thence east three miles to twp. line between ranges 1 and 2 E.

Thence south along said twp. line to its intersection of northeast corner of sec. 13, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence west along north line of said sec. 13 to its intersection of O. & C. stage road.

Thence northwesterly along middle line of said stage road until East Main street in the City of Ashland is reached.

Thence follow the middle line of East Main street to the intersection of Mountain avenue.

Thence north along the middle line of Mountain avenue to the intersection of B street.

Thence westerly along the middle line of B street to the intersection of Fifth street.

Thence southerly along the middle line of Fifth street to the intersection of Main street.

Thence west and northwesterly along the middle line of Main street to the intersection of First avenue.

Thence northerly along the middle line of First avenue to the intersection of Ash street.

Thence westerly along the middle line of Ash street to the intersection of Oak street.

Thence northerly along the middle line of Oak street to the intersection of O. & C. R. R. Thence westerly to the center of Ashland creek.

Thence northerly along the center of Ashland creek to the junction thereof to Bear creek. Thence down Bear creek in a northwesterly direction to the place of beginning.

West Central Precinct—Voting place, McCarty Building, Granite and North Main.

Beginning at the northwest corner of the SW 1/4 of SW 1/4 of sec. 6, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence east along the 1/4-1/4 line to the middle line of Wimer street.

Thence easterly along the middle line of Wimer street to its intersection with the middle line of Main street.

Thence southeasterly along the middle line of Main street to its intersection with the middle line of Granite street.

Thence southerly along the middle line of Granite street to its intersection with Ashland creek.

Thence meander southerly along Ashland creek to its intersection with the south line of SE 1/4 of sec. 32, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence west along the twp. line to southwest corner of sec. 31, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence north along twp. line to the place of beginning.

West Ashland Precinct—Voting place, stone building near North Main and Helman.

Beginning at the intersection of Bear creek and the west line of sec. 30, twp. 38 S., R. 1 E., W. M.

Thence meander southeast along Bear creek to its junction of Ashland creek.

Thence meander southerly along Ashland creek to its intersection with the middle line of O. & C. R. R.

Thence northwesterly along the middle line of O. 1/2 C. R. R. main line track to its intersection with the middle line of Water street.

Thence southwesterly along the middle line of Water street to its intersection with the middle line of Main street.

Thence northwesterly along the middle line of Main street to its intersection with the middle line of Wimer street.

Thence west along the middle line of Wimer street to the end thereof.

Thence westerly along the 1/4-1/4 line to the northwest corner of SW 1/4 of SW 1/4 of sec. 6, twp. 39 S., R. 1 E., W. M., same being a twp. line.

Thence north along said twp. (W. M.) line to the place of beginning.
