### GREEN PEPPERS WITH MEAT.

**F**OR a substantial dish green peppers may be stuffed with meat or with a mixture containing meat. Wash the peppers, removing stems, seeds and membranes. Boil five minutes, plunge in cold water, drain and fill with any preferred mixture.

### Stuffed With Fish.

Stuffed With Salmon.—Cut the stem end from green peppers and scoop out the seeds. Make a salad with one can of salmon, one teaspoonful of pepper seeds, one cupful of chopped celery and sweet pickles. Mix with thick mayonnaise. Stuff the pepper shells and serve on lettuce leaves. A stuffed olive or piece of parsley may be put in the end of the pepper as a garnish.

Stuffed With Oysters.—Remove the stems and seeds from green peppers. Parboil oysters in their own liquor and season with salt. Chop fine half of a large pepper and one very small onion and fry in butter. Mix the fried pepper and onion and oysters together and add breadcrumbs until the stuffing is of a suitable consistency. Stuff the peppers, dot with butter and bake until brown. They may be served with tomato or cream sauce.

### Substantial Foods.

Stuffed With Beef.—Take one onion, eight green peppers, one pound of lean raw beef, one egg, one teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper, one tablespoonful of onion grated or chopped very fine. Cut off the tops of the peppers and remove the seeds. Mix the meat with the egg and the seasoning and fill the peppers with this mixture. Put the onion in the stewpan and just cover with water. Put the peppers in this and stew until they are done.

Stuffed With Veal.—Take large peppers, soak them in salt and water, changing the water constantly to make them less pungent. Cut out the vein that makes them so hot and stuff them with finely chopped veal seasoned with salt, butter, a little onion and parsley, some sweet herbs and crumbs of bread. Stuff the peppers and fry in butter. Serve with a rich gravy.

### HUSBANDS IN WILLEDSEN.

They Mind the Babies at Home While the Wives Go Out to Work.

Willedsen is a perfect paradise for a certain type of husband. There is no need for him to go out to work; his wife will see to that. All he need do is stay at home and mind the baby. He has a job for life and practically nothing to do.

The Gilbertian arrangement is due to the peculiar industrial conditions of Willedsen, where there are many laundries and factories and female labor is much in demand. Although it is cheaper than male labor would be at the same class of work, the wages are good, considering that only five days a week are worked in the laundries, the women not being required on Mondays. As much as from 20 to 30 shillings a week can be earned, £1 being a common wage, even for girls.

Consequently the women rule the industrial world of Willedsen. The positions of man and wife are reversed. There is no need for the man to go to work. Not only would he be unsuitable for the job, but the labor and the wages would not suit him.

Therefore a working girl, when she has saved sufficient money and thinks of marrying, looks around to find an eligible man, whom it would be her duty to keep in after life. He must know how to bathe, dress and feed a baby; how to amuse it and what to do when it has convulsions other than rolling it on the floor or slapping it on the back. If he can do all this the girl proposes, is accepted if she is strong enough to work, and the knot is tied.

When the children grow up they are packed off to the laundries or to one of the biscuit, incandescent mantle or cedar pencil factories that abound in the neighborhood, and their wages go to swell the family income. As for father, he continues his congenial task of warming the baby's milk and performing other little duties. — London Cor. Philadelphia Ledger.
