MINING CONGRESS' BIG SESSION

(Continued from Page One.)

W. D. Agelbert, regretting his inability to the present, sending greetings and endorsing San Francisco as the next meeting place of the congress; letters to same effect from A. L. Crowell, field secretary of California, also from the Hon. W. A. Beard of Sacramento, who was to have delivered an address on "Irrigation, Reclamation and Use of Soil Adjacent to Mining Sections," but who was unable to be present.

Mr. Balfrey, a delegate from Scott Valley, spoke endorsing Etna Mills as the next meeting place, and suggested that the permanent exhibit recommended by F. J. Newman be gathered in the meantime, exhibited at Scott Valley and from there sent to the exposition in San Francisco in charge of a representative of the congress.

After considerable discussion it was moved by O. L. Young and seconded by H. L. Herzinger that the next annual meeting be held within this district instead of at San Francisco, and that a suitable exhibit be provided and sent on from the place of meeting to San Francisco. Motion put and duly carried.

Motion made and duly seconded by Herzinger that a committee of three on "Permanent Organization" be appointed. Motion put and duly carried.

F. J. Newman then submitted a report in writing, as treasurer, and upon motion made and carried the report was accepted and ordered filed.

Moved by Young and seconded by Newman that a committee of seven be appointed on resolutions. There being no further business, the congress adjourned to convene again at 9:30, July 10, 1914.

Congress again convened, whereupon the chair read the following appointments of committees:

1. Nomination and place of meeting—Roscoe J. Anderson of Redding, Cal., chairman; M. H. Balfrey of Etna Mills and H. L. Herzinger of Grants Pass.

2. On permanent organization—F. J. Neman of Medford, chairman; O. L. Young of Ashland and Roscoe J. Anderson of Redding.

3. On resolutions—Dr. A. C. Caldwell, chairman; Prof. H. M. Parks, Ira A. Williams, Hon. H. McN. Hamilton, C. B. Watson, George E. Wells and F. W. Bunnell.

eral Industry of Jackson County," which was well received and treated largely of the reasons for the lack of development. Mr. Lamb laying great stress upon the necessity to do away with dishonest promoters. The address was received and filed. This address was followed by a general discussion in which Mr. Anderson of Redding strongly endorsed the paper, as did O. L. Young, Mr. Bonnell and others, among whom was S. E. Bennett of Denver, Colo., of the Engineering and Mining Journal.

Hon. F. McN. Hamilton, state mineralogist of California, delivered a splendid address on the "Mining Developments of California." The address was received and filed.

President Luce then read a paper prepared and submitted by Professor Milner Roberts, dean of the College of Mines, University of Washington, which was also favorably received and filed.

F. W. Armstrong followed with an informal address in which he strongly endorsed Etna Mills as the next meeting place of the congress, and in which he attributed the falling off of mining in Siskiyou county largely to the employer's liability law of that state.

The next address was given by S. B. Vincent of the corporation department, who appeared in behalf of the Hon. R. A. Watson, the corporation commissioner, now in New York, who was to have been present. Mr. Vincent delivered one of the most ably prepared papers delivered at the congress, his subject being "Blue Sky Law, Its Effect on the Mining Industry." The address was most enthusiastically received and showed that the Blue Sky law has rendered a great service to the people of the state and has actually resulted in furthering the interests of mines and mining, as well as the development of corporations generally. Mr. Vincent succeeded in convincing the congress that the corporation department seeks only to promote and foster all legitimate industries, and that its principal work is in an endeavor to weed out dishonest operators, without reference to who they are, where located, or in what business engaged, but stated that any corporation engaged in a legitimate business and conducted along legitimate lines need not hesitate to co-operate with the department. His address was very strongly endorsed by the congress.

C. B. Watson followed with an interesting address on "Geology and Mineralogy," which was very well received, very instructive and ably rendered.

W. H. Burr, M. E., of Medford read an interesting paper on the subject of "Metallurgical Failures in Southern Oregon and Northern California, Their Prevention and Cure." The address was full of splendid thought and good suggestions, and strongly endorsed the extraction of the ores in the vicinity of the mines rather than the shipment to the smelters or other reducing plants at a large outlay for hauling, freight and treatment charges generally. The paper was received and filed.

THE EXPRESS IS IN THIS TOWN
AND IN TO STAY

FOR seventy-five years—three-quarters of a century—the Express has been the right-hand of the shippers of commercial America. The Express came to Ashland, Ore., in 1866 and it came to stay. For forty-eight years it has been the right-hand of commercial Ashland.

whom this protest—the express companies? No! The merchants of the country—shippers everywhere—petitioned Congress that no action be taken that might have the effect of forcing the express companies to retire. Commercial organizations all over the land have joined in this appeal to Washington.

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This completed the addresses and a short business meeting was held, the president calling for a report of the committee on nomination and place of meeting. The committee reported as follows:

"To the Southern Oregon and Northern California Mining Congress:

"Gentlemen: Your nominating and place of meeting committee wish to make the following recommendations:

"1. That we recommend the congress be held in April or May, 1915, at Etna Mills, Cal., and

"2. That the following be elected as the officers of the congress for the next term:

"President, James T. Logan, Waldo, Josephine county.

"First Vice-President, George W. Metcalf, Kennett, Shasta county, California.

"Second vice-president, J. O. Jilison, Gladstone mine, Shasta county.

"Third vice-president, M. E. Dittmar, Redding, Cal.

"Fourth vice-president, G. A. Reichman, Fort Jones, Siskiyou county.

"Secretary, G. F. Hellmuth, Etna Mills, Cal.

"Treasurer, F. J. Newman, Medford, Ore."

On motion duly made, seconded and submitted, the report of the committee was duly adopted.

The president then called for a report of the resolution committee, which reported as follows:

"Southern Oregon and Northern California Mining Congress.

"Gentlemen: We, your committee on resolutions, respectfully submit for your consideration the adoption of the following resolutions:

"1. Whereas, The people of Ashland have recently shown exceptional enterprise in taking the first serious steps in bringing to a city mineral waters from various springs in this vicinity.

"Be it resolved, That we, the members of the Southern Oregon and Northern California Mining Congress, now in session at Ashland, Ore., commend the Ashland people for their enterprise; that we predict for them nothing less than ultimate success, which will make Ashland one of the most noted watering places in America.

"2. Inasmuch as the mineral resources of California and Oregon are still greatly in an undeveloped stage, and inasmuch as both states have departments organized for the furtherance of the development of these resources,

"Therefore be it resolved, That this congress urgently desires the substantial financial support at the hands of the legislatures of the respective states.

"3. Inasmuch as the operation of the Oregon Blue Sky law should work to the benefit of the mining industries,

"Therefore be it resolved, That it be the sentiment of this congress that all possible assistance and co-operation be given to the commission in charge of the execution of this law.

"4. Inasmuch as this congress has decided to hold its next meeting within the confines of the district represented by this congress, and inasmuch as the commissioner of California for the Panama-Pacific International Exposition has requested that the meeting for 1915 be held in San Francisco, and inasmuch as this congress is a local organization,

"Therefore be it resolved, That this congress express its thanks for the consideration of the commissioner acting for the P. P. I. E. and at the same time express its sentiment in favor of full support to the exposition, and its desire to assist the ex-

position as individuals through other channels."

The resolutions were submitted to the congress for adoption and unanimously carried.

It was moved, seconded and carried that copies of the resolutions be sent to the legislatures of the respective states and to the commissioner in charge of the exposition, and be published.

A communication having been received from the Hon. David N. Dunn of Portland, Ore., requesting an exhibit from the congress to be exhibited at the Land Products Show to be held in Portland, October 26 to November 14 this year, it was moved by Newman and seconded by Young that the president appoint a committee of one member from each county in the district for the purpose of taking immediate steps looking to the preparation of such exhibit for the purpose of displaying same in accordance with said communication and that Mr. Dunn be at once advised of the action of the congress with reference to this matter.

The chair thereupon appointed F. J. Newman of Jackson county and C. L. Mangum of Josephine county to prepare such exhibit, said parties to also act as a committee for said respective counties in the gathering of an exhibit for display at San Francisco, they to act in conjunction with R. H. DeWitt of Yreka, M. H. MacIlwaine of Trinity Center, Cal., and M. E. Dittmar of Redding, Cal., in the preparation of the permanent exhibit of this congress to be sent to San Francisco in 1915 after the convention at Etna Mills.

Moved and seconded and duly carried that the chair appoint a committee of five, one from each county in the district, on membership for the permanent organization.

The chair appointed George E.

Wells of Fort Jones, Cal., M. H. Balfrey of Etna Mills, Cal., F. J. Newman of Medford, Ore., and H. L. Herzinger of Grants Pass, Ore., and each individual member of the congress in general to solicit membership for the permanent organization.

Meeting adjourned after listening to a very interesting address by Professor H. H. Miller, director of the School of Commerce of the University of Oregon, on the possibilities of the development of the mineral springs adjacent to Ashland, and in which he unhesitatingly endorsed the movement and predicted a great future for Ashland, after which the congress adjourned to make a trip to the springs in autos prepared by the committee in charge.
