ISOLATED ISLANDS.

Lonely Tristan da Cunha Gets Outside News Once in Two Years.

Though scientific progress has made it possible to do a double journey between England and America in a fortnight, there remain many islands with which it takes years to communicate.

Off the Scottish coast are the groups of islands known as the Hebrides, Orkneys and Shetlands. Of these the most isolated island is St. Kilda, some three miles long and two miles broad. The inhabitants lead lives of great loneliness, for it takes a month to get to the next island, and the sea often makes any communication with St. Kilda impossible for months.

The group of eight Phoenix islands in the Pacific has a total population of only 158, while another little bit of the British empire is Fanning Island. This is a landing place for the Pacific submarine cable, and usually there are about 100 people in the place.

The loneliest of all parts of British territory is the island of Tristan da Cunha, in the south Atlantic, which is also the smallest inhabited island in the empire. It is 1,800 miles from land, has a population of seventy-four Scottish Americans, and the inhabitants get news of the outer world usually once every two years.—London Stray Stories.

Woolwich Arsenal.

Woolwich arsenal owed its establishment to an explosion which took place at a foundry in Moorfields. Until 1716 the government obtained its ordnance from private manufacturers, but in that year the explosion decided it to build a foundry of its own, and Woolwich, already famous as a naval station, was chosen as the site. Woolwich was only a small fishing village until the sixteenth century, when Henry VIII laid the foundations of its prosperity by making it the royal dockyard.—London Chronicle.

NOTICE OF ANNUAL CITY ELECTION.

Recorder's Office, Ashland, Ore., Nov. 20, 1914.

Public notice is hereby given that the annual city election will be held in the City of Ashland, Oregon, on Tuesday, the 15th day of December, 1914, as provided for in Sections 1 and 2 of Article 4 of the Charter of said city, and pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council duly passed on the 24th day of November, 1914, for the election of a Mayor, a Recorder and a Treasurer to serve for the term beginning January 1st, 1915; one Councilman from the First Ward, to serve for two years beginning January 1st, 1915; one Councilman from the Second Ward, to serve for the full term beginning January 1st, 1915; one Councilman from the Third Ward, to serve for the full term beginning January 1st, 1915; and one Park Commissioner from the city at large, to serve for the term of five years beginning with January 1st, 1915; one Springs Water Commissioner, to serve for the term of three years from January 1st, 1915; also to vote on the question, "Shall the City of Ashland, Oregon, license the sale of spirituous, vinous, malt or intoxicating liquors within the corporate limits of such city, during the municipal year?"

The following named persons have been appointed Judges of Election and the voting places for the respective wards are hereby designated as follows:

First Ward—Voting place, Fourth Street Fire Station Building. Judges—G. W. Benedict, W. A. Bibby and Manley Brower.

Second Ward—Voting place, Millitia Barracks, McCarthy building, corner Main and Granite streets.

Judges—O. C. Tiffany, Mrs. Emma Jack and Nellie Briggs.

Third Ward—Voting place, City Hall. Judges—E. J. Arant, Blanche Hicks and Chas. Johnson.

The two Judges last named in each ward are also appointed to act as Clerks of Election.

The polls will be open from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until 6 o'clock in the afternoon, and all persons who are qualified electors under the laws of the State of Oregon, and have resided thirty days in the city and ten days in the ward immediately preceding the election, shall be entitled to vote in their respective wards at such election.

The election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of the State of Oregon so far as practicable.
