trol of this disease in California as well as in Oregon when applied in the fall. If we can use it in the spring also without injury, it will give us an added advantage in the control of this pest.

Spray rigs should be put into good working condition before the season begins and kept that way. Be sure that everything is clear so that pressure developed at the pump will not be lost in the hose or at the nozzle. See to it that a uniformly high pressure is maintained (approximately 200 pounds) throughout the operation. This is especially important for the calyx spray. For this codling moth spray use a nozzle with a 45-degree angle so that the spray can be forced directly down into the calyx cups, and make frequent examinations of blossoms in least accessible places to be sure that the work is being successfully done.

Arrangements have been made for studying specifically the codling moth problem of the valley this season, and with the co-operation of the growers we hope to be able to reduce the percentage of wormy fruit to a minimum.

I shall be glad to discuss specific problems of fungus or insect control with any farmer or orchardist, and co-operate with him in the solution of these problems.

Obituary.

Ira C. Dodge was born January 3, 1842, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Nellie Loomis, February 27, 1915, aged 73 years, one month and 24 days. His birthplace was Henniker, N. H. He removed with his parents from New Hampshire to Monticello, Iowa, in the year 1852. Here he was united in marriage on June 14, 1869, to Miss Martha Guy. Moved from Iowa to Oregon in 1883. Located in Ashland, and this has been his home until his death. Since the death of Mrs. Dodge a few years ago he has lived with his daughter, Mrs. Loomis.

Mr. Dodge held membership in no organization save that of the Grand Army of the Republic. He enlisted first in the 17th Iowa and after one year of service was discharged on account of disability. Re-enlisted in the 31st Iowa and served for one year and a half.

A son, Frank E. Dodge, resides in Dillard, Ore.; Fred Dodge in Ashland, employed by the Southern Pacific railroad. Mrs. Florence Shina of Medford and Mrs. C. L. Loomis of Ashland survive him.

Mr. Dodge also has two brothers who survive him, J. P. Dodge of Ashland and Warren Dodge of Medford.

A large circle of friends mourn the loss of an old friend, Mr. Dodge having been one of Ashland's oldest residents and revered by all.

Interment was Monday afternoon in the Ashland cemetery under the direction of the G. A. R. Post and the Woman's Relief Corps. Rev. H. A. Carnahan of the Presbyterian church, officiating clergyman.
