## U. OF O. TRACK MEET UNDER NEW PLAN

The University of Oregon is preparing to send invitations to nearly 200 high schools in Oregon to send entries to the annual interscholastic track meet to be held there May 15. At this time the best athletes from all over the state will be in Eugene to compete for the championship of the state.

One hundred athletes will be in attendance. This is but half the number that came last year, but a new system is to be introduced this year. The plan is to eliminate those athletes who are not in the winning class and cut out those who come, without a chance to win, largely for the trip at the expense of the student body of the university.

The elimination is to be made by the university. Every school in the state is asked to hold its tryout in a regulation manner, and the records of the winners will be submitted to the university. From these records the university authorities will select the state's 100 best athletes, and these will compete.

In this manner much of the cumbersome of a large meet will be eliminated and more than ever the races will be those of extreme interscholastic skill against skill. This annual event has been something looked forward to by the high schools of the state, and they train for it as the university and O. A. C. teams train for each other. The Portland teams view each other with especial competition, and at the same time it gives the athletes outside of the metropolis an opportunity to meet the much-touted Portland runners.

### Willard and Johnson.

A fight for the world's heavyweight pugilistic championship will take place at Havana, Cuba, Saturday, April 3, between Jack Johnson and Jess Willard.

The last obstacle in the way of having the fight take place here was removed when Jack Curley, who endeavored to have the men meet at Juarez, Mexico, March 6 received a cablegram from Willard saying that he would start immediately for Havana, arriving there from New Orleans March 15. The terms for the fight are identical with those which would have prevailed had the encounter taken place at Juarez.

Mr. Curley will act as the chief promoter, and will be assisted by Richard Klegin, as managing director. The site for the battle has not yet been selected, but excellent places are available.

Johnson has begun training at Havana. Wilson will probably have training quarters at Marienac.

### Applegate Field Meet.

May 20 is to be the big day in the Applegate Valley. On that date will be held the annual Valley Pride picnic in conjunction with a field meet to be participated in by all the schools of the Applegate Valley, from Wilderville to Watkins, some twenty in number, part in Josephine, part in Jackson county.

It is expected that the attendance this year will be upward of two thousand people.

A silver cup has been provided for the school winning the most points, this to be contested for at each annual meet till some school wins it for three consecutive times. No other prizes have been offered in the interscholastic meet. In the afternoon, however, a second field meet will be

held, open to all comers, in which valuable prizes will be offered. These prizes are to be subscribed by the business men of Grants Pass and Medford.

The usual basket dinner will be part of the program, and the evening will be given to dancing.

### Dewey Will Coach.

"Admiral" Dewey, Oregon Agricultural College all-around athlete and former Ashlander, has quit college and has accepted a position as athletic coach at The Dalles high school. Dewey has made a name for himself in basketball, track and football, and will be a valuable man for the fortunate high school which secured his services. His loss will be greatly felt by the track team at O. A. C. as he was counted upon to take points in the distance.

The latest from Medford is that Ashland sluffed off on the first game and let Medford win so that the Medford sports would put up their money on the second game at that city. Come again, Medford, we Ashlanders wouldn't have let any pecuniary consideration take precedence over the pleasure of winning four straight.

Jefferson high school has captured the basketball championship of Portland. This is the first time in history that Jefferson has won over the other Portland schools. "Mush" Calvin, star with the Corvallis team which played here both last year and two years ago, plays center for the champs.

Another white hope has gone the way of the rest. Arthur Pelky was knocked out by Jim Coffey in the second round of a scheduled ten-round fight in New York city.

Washington.—If you do not own property valued at \$15.48 you are being cheated out of your rights. The Census Bureau has announced that all property in the United States in 1912 subject to ad valorem taxation had an assessed valuation of \$69,452,936,109, an increase in ten years of \$24,114,619,221, or 96.5 per cent. The net debt of the federal and state governments and all minor civil divisions in the United States in 1913 was \$4,850,460,713, or \$49.97 per capita.

The national government's share was \$1,028,564,055, or \$10.59 per capita, and that of the states \$345,942,305, or \$3.57 for each person.

### Notice to Ashland Taxpayers.

In pursuance of a recent case wherein O. H. Johnson was plaintiff and Jackson county was defendant, and the Circuit and Supreme Courts having held that Ashland taxpayers were exempt from the payment of general road tax levied by the county in 1913, and whereas a stipulation was entered into at the time the case was in progress, whereby the county is morally bound to repay any amount that was paid into the county on the taxes due in 1913 by the taxpayers as heretofore set out.

The County Court provided for the payment of these amounts out of the taxes due in 1915; therefore, in pursuance of the foregoing, notice is hereby given to all persons that paid general road tax due in 1913 that the amount will be repaid upon application or claim being filed with the undersigned at Jacksonville, Oregon.

No "red tape" is necessary in this matter. Either write a letter or file a bill for the amount and give the number of the tax receipt you received at the time of making the payment, if convenient, and the matter will be adjudicated as soon as the money is on hand from 1915 taxes.
