> No. 1. Ordinary table syrup, the kind used for waffles and pancakes. No. 2. Decayed banana,

> No. 3. Salmon from a can; the salmon had been exposed to the sun. No. 4. Crab that has been left in the sun until decay had begun exten-

No. 5. A mash made of bran. mixed very wet with waste potato water and skimmed milk, sweetened with molasses (brown sugar will do), and containing plenty of active yeast so that it had fermented furiously.

These five preparations were put into five traps and the traps were set out side by side at a Eugene fly headquarters. The results after 20 minutes' exposure of the traps were as follows:

No. 1. Four flies. No. 2. Ten files.
