Portland Stock Report.

The receipts for Monday are: Cattle 1,103, calves 17, hogs 3,660, sheep 1,887.

Cattle—Monday's receipts were fairly heavy though nothing startling in the way of quality was in evidence. Some fairly good steers sold at \$7.25 although the bulk went at \$6.75 to \$7; cows \$6 to \$6.25 and heifers \$6 to \$6.50. Market considered steady.

Hogs—More hogs came forward beginning of week than for some time. Everything considered, market was strong. Bulk brought \$7.70 to \$7.75, tops at \$7.80.

Sheep—No change in the sheep market, only a handful being in evidence to begin the week's trade. Market steady.

Call For Laborers Is Widespread

War orders from Europe, the prospective record-breaking crop of wheat now being harvested and heavy yields of other grains are creating a new demand for labor, according to indications at the government employment office in the department of labor, Washington, D. C.

Requests for workers are coming from many manufacturers throughout the country and from state labor commissioners.

Oklahoma is said to need from 16,000 to 18,000 harvest hands, and Kansas 35,000.

An Oregon association has applied for 1,000 berry pickers. An arms and ammunition plant in Connecticut has asked for 300 men. Zinc and lead mines in Missouri need 1,000 laborers. A Maryland steel company has applied for 100 hands. In West Virginia 2,000 coal mine employees are wanted.

So far the department has been more successful in the cities than in the country in placing men who want work. Of the 3,449 for whom it secured places last month, 1,500 were sent to Chicago alone, a railroad company having applied for several thousand track workers. It is said that about 25 per cent of all applicants for jobs during May were placed through the department's efforts.
