The Jackson County Fair is only one month away. It will be held at Medford September 9, 10 and 11. Every boy and girl in the county is urged to bring or send anything that they have prepared or can prepare to exhibit.

Many premiums are offered, prizes that are well worth working for. We are printing a list herewith. Read it over carefully. Even though you may have made no preparation thus far, there is still time to get in on some of the prizes. Two boys will be given trips to the State Fair at Salem. Three girls will be taken to Crater Lake. Many other commodity and cash prizes will be given, as you will see by reading the list herewith. Altogether more than \$300 in premiums will be given to the boys and girls of Jackson county.

We realize that many of you have things that you would like to exhibit, but you are perhaps a long ways from Medford and have no means of getting your exhibits there. September 8, forenoon—Rogue River, Argus office; Rock Point, school house; Gold Hill, News office; Sams Valley, store; Table Rock, store; Jacksonville; Applegate, store; Ruth, store; Soda Springs, school house; Nell Creek, school house; Ashland, Commercial Club; Talent, Talent Mercantile Company; Phoenix, Phoenix Mercantile Company; Central Point, W. ### Farm Magazine Features Ranch

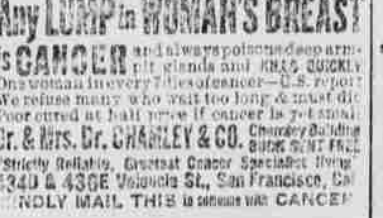
The Orchard and Farm magazine for August contains a story concerning a Rogue River valley ranch which is of much interest. An interesting page story with a large picture of the Bodge ranch is prefaced by the following introduction:

"It is a big job to find a farm in any district that comes up to what a farm in theory ought to be. Try to think of some one in your vicinity who is conducting his farming operations in every particular both wisely and well and getting results that a person wanting to see the right farming for the district would go to see. 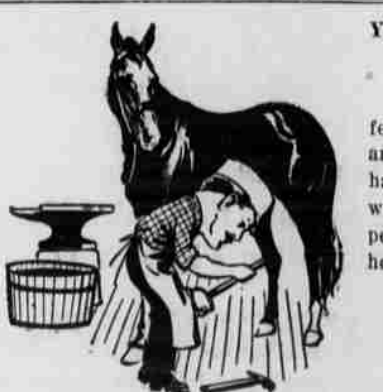
