The students will be carried to Ashland by the Interurban and Steamer auto lines at the rate of 7 cents for single fare.

Valley Woman Gets Big Claim

Including burial expenses of \$100, the total amount that the State Industrial Accident Commission will pay Mrs. C. A. Wood of Butte Falls as death claim for her husband will be \$15,444.53. The husband was killed while working in a sawmill of the Pelican Bay Lumber Company at Klamath Falls, August 16.

Mrs. Wood has five children which causes the claim to exhaust the \$50 monthly allowance. The law specifies that \$30 monthly shall be paid the widow and \$6 monthly additional for each child under 16 years of age unless there are so many children that the \$50 limit is exceeded, which is true in this case. To keep within the limit it was necessary for the commissioners to figure one child at \$2 monthly and to leave one out of the figuring entirely. The total amount that has been set aside with the state treasurer at 4 per cent interest to pay the entire claim is \$8,958.35.

There are those who take the view that the commission can not allow the vouchers unless they are signed by Lewis, but there is little doubt that they will be passed.

The presentation of vouchers signed by Cantine may open the issue of whether Engineer Lewis could legally be relieved of highway responsibility by the recent resolution.
