If you want to ascend in the world, tie yourself to somebody.

Let us cultivate a public spirit and talk less and work more. Encourage our local authorities in making improvements. Speak up, speak well, talk encouragingly of Ashland and its bright prospects. It is these many little considerations that make a town grow. Nature has showered upon us her choicest blessings, and with perfect unity and effort for the good of our common cause, great will be the result.

In ten months up to May 1, 1915, exports of horses from the United States were 215,759, valued at \$47,250,000, as compared with 20,239, worth \$3,000,000, in the corresponding period of the preceding year. Most of them went to Europe for war use. France received 98,146, England 71,695, Canada 27,281, other countries 18,637. The average export value of this year's horses was \$221.50; last year \$144.18.
