The street committee stated that the water which did the damage came from the ditches of the Smith-Emery people and that in their opinion this company could be held responsible, and suggested that the matter be referred to the springs commission, who had contracts with Smith, Emery & Co. The report was approved.

A requisition from the electric light department for material, the cost of which aggregates approximately \$345, was passed.

A petition regarding an appropriation for the band was favorably received, as is reported elsewhere,

The paving, fireman's pay and several other matters were takin care of, as discussed elsewhere.
