The committee made plans and specifications for carrying out the project, which included a new front to correspond to rest of building, as to windows, door and finish, the lath and plastering of walls and ceiling: also a cement floor in east seven feet of present room, with two tollets and two washbowls installed; also a new floor in balance of room, being about 12x21 feet. In this latter room it was planned to have a 6x7-foot 12x15 feet in the clear.

The expense is estimated at \$375. The committee recommends to the new council that this work be completed next year, and regrets pressure of other matters and delay in completing the jail made it impracticable to do the work this year.'
