DEPOT DOINGS.

The Roseburg News gives the following summary of the damage caused by the wreck which occurred at Winchester, four miles north of Roseburg, when two freight trains collided at the approach of a bridge over the Umpqua river: "Although the amount of damage due Fireman Glenn Patrick for the loss of his left arm and the amount due on the contents of the wrecked freight cars has not been determined, the damage due to the rolling stock and materials of the Southern Pacific Company in Saturday's collision has been placed at \$4,720. The damage to the engines is placed at \$1,800, to the cars \$2,600, while the repairs on the track and bridge will amount to \$320. Besides this will be the expense of labor of the two wrecking crews and the bridge men.

The crews at work on the construction of the car sheds are making good progress and hope to be able to complete their job within a short period.

Business is still holding up well in the freight department, although the passenger department, outside of local holiday traffic, is light.

Southern Pacific reports for a period extending from July to November, 1915, show that the greatest volume of traffic for a single day during that time was 81 trains over the Shasta division, 61 over the Sierra division and 58 over the Tehachapi Pass.

Commercial Club Have Busy Meet

The Ashland Commercial Club met in regular monthly session last Monday evening with a good attendance of members present. Two applications, from Dr. Woods and W. T. Veghte, were accepted.

Frank Jordan offered a motion that the Commercial Club authorize the trustees to continue the payment of \$25 per month to the band, same having been voted during the summer and only one payment made. Motion carried. This money will go toward the development of the young material at the present time, a work which has been most auspiciously commenced under the direction of Director Carl Loveland.

The hotel committee through Mr. Reed, chairman, reported that they were progressing nicely and that they thought work would be started on the remodeling of the Hotel Oregon within a short time, as the money was practically assured with which to do the work.

After the consolidation of the Business Men's Association with the club, celebration, bathhouse and other matters, taken care of elsewhere in this issue, were discussed.

Adjournment followed.
