H. C. Hazen is taking H. Bowman's place on the mail route. Mr. Bowman is very ill with lagrippe.

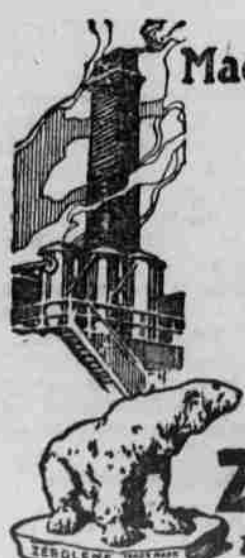
Henry Summers of Wagner creek was a business visitor here Friday.
