L. L. Mult Tells Portlanders of Park

Lloyd L. Mult, formerly cashier of the First National Bank of Ashland, later government bank official of the northwest and now vice-president of the Northwestern National Bank of Portland, although living in Portland is one of the real lovers of Ashland and boosters for Ashland. The following article recently appeared in the Portland Telegram:

"Returning from a trip to Ashland, Lloyd L. Mult, vice-president of the Northwestern National Bank, is enthusiastic over what has been done at his former home to make it attractive to seekers of pleasure, health and homes. Carried through as a municipal enterprise, the Ashland park is now a fairly-like place. Proceeds of \$175,000 in bonds have been used to bring into the city the waters from three city-owned mineral springs and for improving the public park, which is within a half block of the postoffice and the business sections of Ashland.

"I am proud of the achievements of my old home city," said Banker Mult. "Ashland Lithia Park has been transformed into a place of beauty and utility. Water from the city's lithia, soda and sulphur springs and from the supply from the mountains for domestic uses has been piped into the park. Playing fountains and other devices for showing the four kinds of water in action or use by turning faucets make an interesting and picturesque sight.

"Nature has done its part to make a wonderfully attractive park right at the edge of the business district, but what was lacking has been provided by the efforts of the people by authorizing the city officials to go to all reasonable limits to make the park all that could be desired. A tennis court and a croquet ground have been supplied and a golf course is to go in. Everything in the park is free and the people are enjoying the attractions there.

"The automobile camping ground in the park is proving a star attraction to travelers and it is expected that a great many touring parties will take advantage of it.

"All of northern California and southern Oregon are talking about Ashland's Lithia Park as the playground for the thousands of people within reach of Ashland. During a three days' celebration of July 4 the city's splendid efforts to make of Ashland a mecca for the entire Pacific coast and the country east of the mountains will be marked by dedication and formal opening of the matchless park."

The following article appeared in Thursday's Portland Oregonian:

"L. L. Mult, vice-president of the Northwestern National Bank, who has returned from Ashland and other points in the southern part of the state, is enthusiastic over the developments in progress there.

"Mr. Mult was particularly impressed with the earnest work and confidence displayed by the people of Ashland in developing their mineral springs and natural park.

"They have one of the finest parks at Ashland I have seen anywhere," said Mr. Mult. "They have made splendid use of the money derived through the recent sale of municipal bonds and already are beginning to reap some of the benefits."

"He pointed out that Ashland is one of the principal points on the route of automobile tourists between Portland and San Francisco and that adequate arrangements have been made to accommodate visitors of this kind. Provision has been made for them in the public park so that they can camp out in comfort. The nat-

County Voters Fewer Than 1914

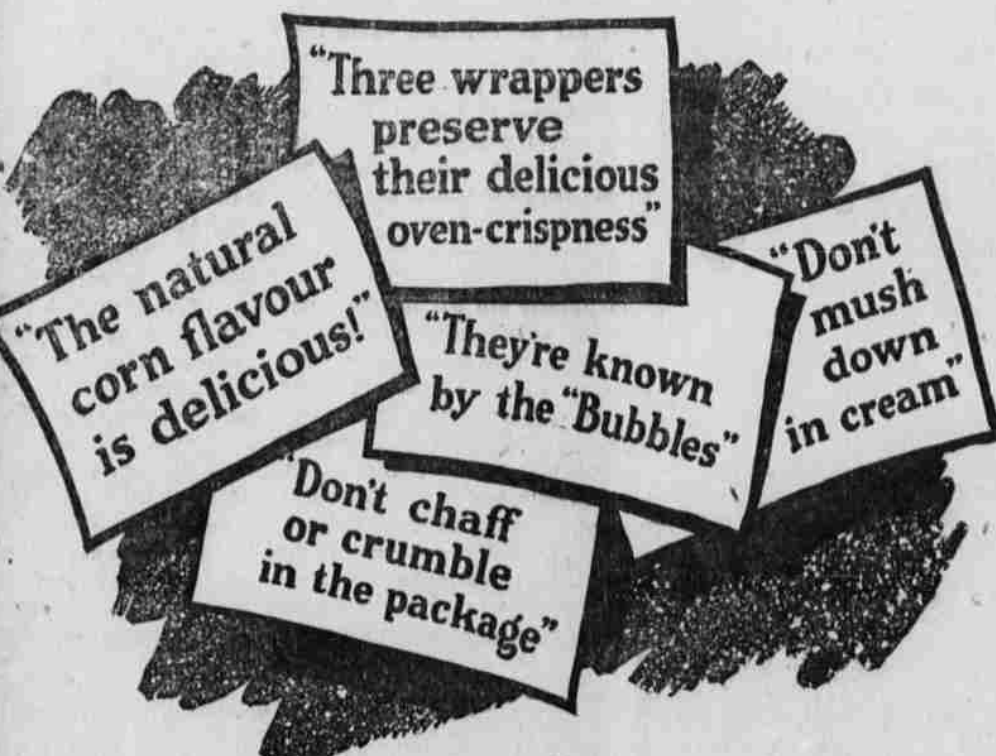
Registration in Jackson county in the year 1914 was totaled at 8,561, our county standing fifth in the state. In 1916 only 7,649 voters registered and the rating dropped to sixth. At the same time the registration increased from 229,601 to 241,142 in the state.

The republican party is stronger according to the registration, showing an increase of 263. The democrats are weaker by 824, according to the registration. The progressives dropped from 274 to 36. The prohibitionists, with their main ambition a dry Oregon, accomplished, dropped from 546 to 156. The socialists and miscellaneous parties all dropped considerably.
