Phoenix Lad Struck by Auto

When he pedaled his bicycle from behind a load of hay on the Pacific Highway Wednesday afternoon Berthold Hearn was struck by a machine driven by Mrs. George Portel of Medford. Hearn, who is 15 years of age, lives with his parents in Phoenix.

Hearn was thrown through the windshield of the car and sustained two badly cut arms and a lacerated ear. The radiator and lamps of the car were smashed by the impact.

No blame is attached to either of the parties to the accident, as according to eyewitnesses of the accident, Hearn turned out suddenly from behind the load of hay just as the car turned out to pass it. The head-on collision occurred before the car could be stopped. Mrs. A. B. Cunningham of Medford was the other occupant. A passing machine picked up the lad and carried him to Phoenix, where medical assistance was given.

Militiamen Will Hold S. P. Jobs

The Southern Pacific Company announces that those of its employees who were members on June 17, 1916, of the National Guard of any state its lines traverse, and who are called out for army service, are granted leave of absence with the understanding that they will retain their promotion rights, and they can resume their positions with the company when the government relieves them from service.

While such employees are serving in the army in response to the call of the government, the company will allow, until September 30 of this year, to enlisted men, whether non-commissioned officers or privates:

1. To those married, full pay.
 2. To those unmarried, with family, three-quarters to full pay, according to controlling circumstances.
 3. To those unmarried, without dependent families, half pay.
- The company will allow to commissioned officers above and including the grade of second lieutenant:
1. To those married, the difference between company and government pay, when government pay is less.
 2. To those unmarried with dependent families, three-quarters full pay, but with government pay added thereto, not to exceed regular salary.
 3. To those unmarried without dependent families, one-half full pay, but, with government pay added thereto, not to exceed regular salary.
