Medford Tribune: Seeley Hall and party returned Saturday afternoon from an attempt to reach the rim of Crater Lake in a Cadillac car. They succeeded in getting within a half mile of Camp Steel, and within three miles of the rim. They traveled over the Castle creek road. On the Medford road autos can go within three miles of the lower camp. Seeley states it will not be possible for an auto to make the rim of the lake before July 15. The snow will now hold up a wagon. So far this season 196 persons have registered at the park, all being tourists who were walking to the wonder spot of the west.
