Ashland Company Takes Federal Oath

About twenty members of the Ashland company of the Coast Artillery Corps took the federal oath Monday. Forty-five member stood the oath a week ago Saturday, ten last Monday. The Ashland company is now part of the federal system, the taking of the oath being necessary so that the men may benefit by the federal pay for militia. The Ashland company is now about seventy-five strong.

The oath of the officers under the new regime is as follows:
"I do solemnly swear that I will support and defend the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the state of Oregon against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will obey the orders of the president of the United States and the governor of the state of Oregon; that I will make this oath freely, without any mental reservations or purpose of evasion, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of the national guard of the United States and state of Oregon upon which I am about to enter."

The oath of the enlisted men is different and follows:
"I do hereby acknowledge to have enlisted this 30th day of June, 1916, as a soldier in the service of the United States and of the state of Oregon for the period of three years in service and three years in reserve under the conditions prescribed by law, unless sooner discharged by the proper authorities, and I also solemnly swear that I will bear true and faithful allegiance to the United States of America and to the state of Oregon and that I will serve them honestly and faithfully against all enemies whomsoever and that I will obey the orders of the president of the United States and of the governor of the state of Oregon and of the officers appointed over me, according to law and the rules and articles of war. This oath is subscribed to with the understanding that credit will be given in the execution of this contract for the period which I have already served under my current enlistment in the organized militia of the state of Oregon."

The colonel and companies will each receive from the government the sum of \$500 a year, the first lieutenants \$240 a year and the second lieutenants \$200 a year. All enlisted men will receive one-fourth of the pay of the enlisted men of the regular army. A private will get \$4 a month or \$48 a year, and corporals and sergeants in proportion.

Issues Many Water Permits in June

During the quarter ending June 30, 1916, State Engineer John H. Lewis issued 137 permits for the appropriation of water, including six for the construction of reservoirs. According to these permits, it is proposed to irrigate 7,616 acres of land, store 1,440 acre feet of water and develop power at a number of small individual power plants for private use.

The following permits were issued in Jackson county:

- S. Moskallunos of Chicago, for the irrigation of 62 acres, diverting water from Rogue river in Sec. 20, T. 36 S., R. 4 W.
- Grant Davis of Talent, for the irrigation of 18 acres, diverting water from Bear creek in Sec. 31, T. 38 S., R. 1 E.
- E. B. Hanley of Medford, for the irrigation of 170 acres, diverting water from Jackson creek in Sec. 28, T. 38 S., R. 2 W.
- D. E. Cottrell of Beagle, for the irrigation of 19 acres, diverting water from Evans creek in Sec. 16, T. 34 S., R. 2 W.
- A. M. Geary of Portland, for the irrigation of 10 acres, diverting water from Murphy creek in Sec. 15, T. 38 S., R. 2 W.
- Rogue River Commercial Orchard Company of Medford, for the irrigation of 154 acres, diverting water from springs in Sec. 19, T. 36 S., R. 1 E.
- W. E. Phipps of Medford, for the irrigation of 18 acres, diverting water from Rogue river in Sec. 22, T. 36 S., R. 3 W.
- A. B. Pomeroy of Central Point, for the irrigation of 5 acres, including domestic supply, diverting water from springs in Sec. 8, T. 37 S., R. 2 W.
- William Sears of Butte Falls, for the irrigation of 2 acres, diverting water from the East Fork of Ginger creek, in Sec. 14, T. 35 S., R. 2 E.
- J. A. Perry of Medford, for the irrigation of 30 acres, diverting water from Griffin creek in Sec. 27, T. 37 S., R. 2 W.

Obituary.
Robert P. Edgington was born in Brown county, Ohio, June 23, 1834, and died at Ashland, Ore., July 3, 1916. He was the oldest of three brothers and two sisters, of whom two brothers are still living. He was married to Julia A. Hallam. To them four children were born. Two are still living, Mrs. Frank L. Parker of Hutchinson, Kan., and M. C. Edgington of Ashland. Mrs. Edgington died February 23, 1881, and on January 31, 1883, Mr. Edgington was married to Manie Fisher. To this union was born one son, Floyd B., of Modesto, Cal. Mrs. Edgington died December 12, 1912.

On June 23, 1860, Brother Edgington confessed Christ and was baptized, being the first person in his vicinity to accept Christ on the New Testament plea. He was a faithful member from that time to the end, serving the church in an official capacity, and was an elder at the time of his death. Though a great sufferer the last year of his life, he maintained a uniformly cheerful disposition. While he lived his seat in the house of worship was never vacant while he was able to attend.

Brother Edgington was a veteran of the civil war, enlisting in the summer of 1862, and was mustered out at the close of the war as first lieutenant. Services at the grave by the G. A. R. Sermon by the writer, from 1st Thes., 4:13.

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
