National Forest Maps for Campers

Recreation maps of the Deschutes, Ochoco, Oregon, Siskiyou, Stenslow and Umatilla national forests of Oregon, and the Chelan, Olympic and Washington national forests of Washington have been completed by the Department of Agriculture, and are now being distributed to those who desire them. These maps show the available roads and trails, the location of ranger stations, lookout stations, and other points of interest on the forests. A special map of the Columbia Gorge park in Oregon is also being distributed.

On the back of these maps are printed a description of the forest and other information of value to campers and tourists, together with rules regarding forest fires and the sanitation of camps.

It is planned to prepare and print similar maps of the remaining national forests until all are covered. The maps are especially useful to hunters, fishermen, campers and tourists on the national forests. Copies may be obtained from the District Forester, Portland, Ore., or from the Supervisor of any forest for which the map has been published.

"Birth of a Nation" At Page, Medford

Those who attended the "Birth of the Nation", which opens a three-day engagement at the Page theatre Medford, Thursday, July 27, will doubtless be struck by the effects which makes the scenes so realistic, but none who has not seen the apparatus realizes what an immense amount of paraphernalia is necessary.

The company carries with it altogether a large baggage car load of apparatus, including dynamos, transformers, reducers, projection machines, booth and curtain. In addition there are a remarkable array of noise-making apparatus.

When, for instance, watching the reproduction of the great battle in which the soldiers of the north and south are entrenched within 200 yards of each other, one hears the roar of the cannon, the cries of the dying and wounded soldiers, the dull explosions of underground mines. This is how these effects are accomplished:

To produce other noises there are crashes, drums, cymbals and seemingly every kind of an instrument that produces a horrifying noise, which, when sounded at the right time, seem to come from the very heart of the picture. There is not a word spoken on the stage, every employee being on the alert to watch for his signal from the electrician.

The object of this review shows to what extent the exhibitors went to make their picture the greatest and most realistic success ever staged.

Adding not so much to the realism as to expression is the great 30-piece orchestra to aid in interpreting the picture.

It is the claim of the producer, D. W. Griffith, that "The Birth of the Nation" is the production true in historical fact in the effects produced and in settings with local color.

Famous Layton Placer Mine Sold

One of the most momentous placer deals ever closed in Southern Oregon is the sale of the famous Layton placer mine on Upper Williams creek, west of Grants Pass, to a Boston syndicate known as the Pacific Placer company, with Austin Wilson, of Boston, at its head, announcement of which was made Saturday night.

The Layton property, comprising 600 acres, has been one of the foremost producers of Southern Oregon for more than 40 years and made of J. T. Layton, its original locator and owner for half a century, a very wealthy man.

Since Mr. Layton's death, 10 years ago, the mine has been worked by the heirs of the estate and has made a handsome showing every year. Now the heirs are all of age and the mine is sold by G. W. Colvig, administrator, for the purpose of distribution among the heirs. The sale only awaits the order of the probate court.

It is the intention of the new owners to consolidate the Layton property with 400 acres of adjoining placer ground which they own, install modern machinery and put a full crew to work.

There are 38 miles of ditches connected with the property, and the water rights involved are among the most valuable in the state. The water is delivered to the hydraulic giants under a head of 300 feet.

Promise Medford State Fowl Show

The Southern Oregon Poultry association has received a communication from President E. J. McClanahan of the State Poultry association in which practical assurances are given that the next poultry show, which will be held in December, will come to Medford. President McClanahan writes to President E. W. Hunter of the valley association that all of the state members in Lane county are for Medford and that he has reason to believe that many in Marion and adjoining counties are also strongly in favor of Medford.

There are 36 members of the State Poultry association in this end of the valley. Of course, these votes will all go to Medford when the election shall be held in December. As a matter of fact, there ought to be a large association membership in Southern Oregon—and there probably will be by the time the votes shall be cast.

The Southern Oregon Poultry association is only a few months old, but it already has to its credit one of the best district poultry shows ever held in the state, outside of Portland. State officials, including Governor Withycombe, so declared it while in Medford, and other prominent poultry raisers confirm this estimate. It is proved to be a valuable exhibit for Southern Oregon and surprised even the most sanguine as to

the interest taken in poultry production in this part of the state.

The state poultry show will attract scores of leading exhibitors of the Northwest, as well as all of the best pens of Southern Oregon. In addition to that it will attract hundreds of visitors. But, beyond all that, it will be educational in a very substantial way. It will greatly increase interest in poultry production in the valley and largely improve the methods of money making in that industry. Southern Oregon is known to be one of the most ideal poultry regions on the continent. Every condition favors it. Jackson county should ship away a million dollar's worth of poultry every year, and there is no doubt expressed by those familiar with the business and local conditions that it will soon be doing that very thing.

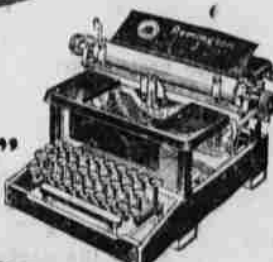
