Obituary.

Funeral services of B. T. Wyant were conducted from the home of his son, Louis Wyant, at 868 A street, on Wednesday, October 18, 1916, Rev. H. A. Carnahan, D. D., pastor, officiating. Interment was made in the Stevens cemetery at Talent.

Benjamin Thomas Wyant was born August 6 1844, in Brown county, Indiana, and died at Ashland October 15, 1916, at the age of 72 years, 2 months and 9 days.

Four sons and seven daughters mourn the loss of this loved one, but because of unavoidable circumstances one son and two daughters could not be present.

Mr. Wyant was a pioneer of Oregon, having crossed the plains from Keokuk county, Iowa, in 1862, driving six yoke of oxen, at the age of 19 years.

He followed mining as an occupation, his fields of labor being in varied locations in Idaho, Nevada and Oregon.

In 1862 he drove a freight team from Boise, Idaho, to Jackson creek, from there to Elko, Nev., and later to Silver City, Idaho.

He came to Portland in 1865 and was married to Lewisie Klise in 1871. The following year his wife departed this life, leaving Mr. Wyant and a little son, Lewis, only eight days old. He was later married to Melinda Jane Traylor. Twelve children blessed their union. Two sons and the mother preceded Mr. Wyant in death.

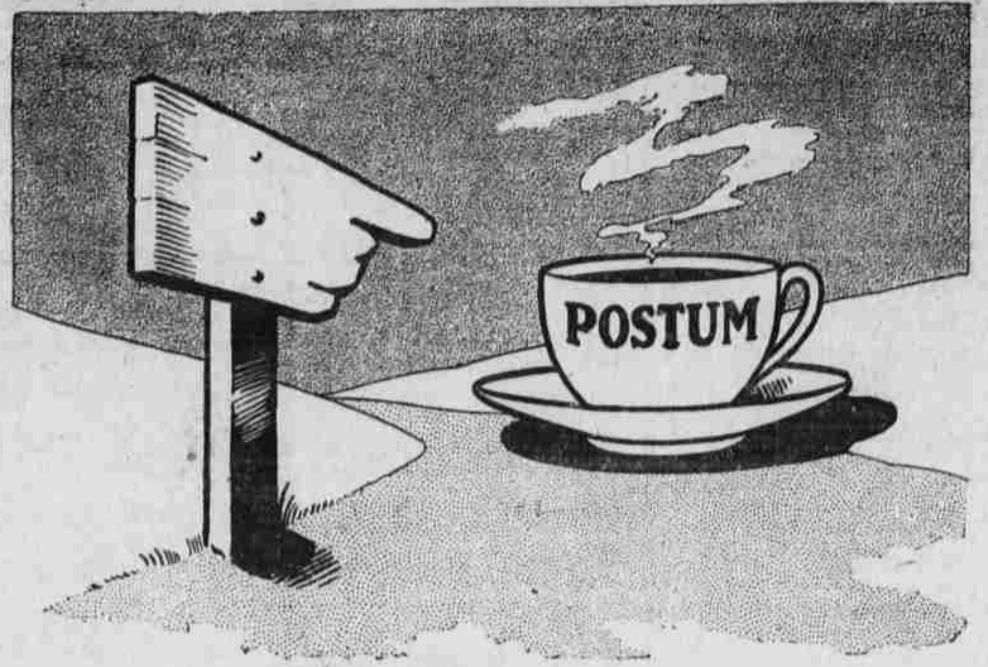
