FRUIT and FARM

Clean Grounds Help Control Pests.

"My little suburban place is a striking example of the value of clean grounds in pest control," said a Corvallis gardener. "When I moved onto the place it was overgrown with weeds, littered with crop remnants, and fringed with high grass strewn with boards, sods and other trash, under which insects swarmed and disease lurked. By cleaning the grounds and its borders and practicing the recommendations of the college specialists, the soil has quit producing weeds and crop pests and is putting its full strength into valuable crops. I have no weeds, no diseases, and but few insects."

Information Begins at Experiment Stations.

Approximately everything known about plant diseases and insect pests has been discovered by experiment stations, and the Oregon station has made many valuable contributions to this fund of information. Why eastern methods of controlling codling

moth are not effective in Oregon and what systems are effective here were brought out by this station. The cause of apple tree anthracnose and how to prevent it is another discovery of value to the apple world. Lime-sulphur for control of apple scab is still another, the use of which this year in Oregon has been worth hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Winter Short Course January 8 to February 2.

Agriculture, engineering (including road building, wood working and blacksmithing), home economics and commerce will join in offering courses for the annual winter short courses, January 8 to February 2. Farm engines, including tractors, will be a feature of the work this year. Oregon farmers will have unusual opportunities to learn the operation and uses of these modern farm power machines. General and advanced work in agriculture, stock raising, dairying and poultry will be offered by college and farm specialists. Enrichment of home life will be furthered by the work in home economics, supplemented by that of bacteriology, physiology, and art and architecture. Full particulars on application to the Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore.

Farmers' and Homemakers' Week.

Farmers' and homemakers' week and conferences will be held at the Oregon Agricultural College January 1 to 6 inclusive. Instruction by members of the college staff, farmers, practicing specialists, experts from the United States Department of Agriculture, including some of the most capable talent in the United States and Canada, will be featured. Many organizations will convene; conferences on subjects of interest in the development of the state will be staged; entertainments and banquets will be offered. There are no entrance fees or educational requirements. All are invited. Special rates on all railroads will be available, as well as moderately priced accommodations in Corvallis.

Weather Favors Fruit Men.

Orchard owners of western Oregon have an unusual opportunity to make up for the failure to spray early, and still may get ahead of the rains, which are responsible for the infection periods. Spray at once for apple-tree anthracnose and for peach blight. Use Bordeaux 6-6-60 or lime-sulphur 1-8, and cover every particle of bark and every bud. Effective results can not usually be obtained so late in the season, but due to the lateness of rains this year much good can be accomplished yet if the work is done at once.

Portland Stock Report, November 7.

Cattle—A very light run of 600 head opened the week's trading. The keen demand from both local and outside packers and butchers advanced prices 15 to 35 cents on all kinds of cattle. The quality of Monday's run was very common. There were a few loads of good cattle here. One load of good steers brought \$6.75, with a few other sales at \$6.60, the balance of steers selling from \$3.50 to \$6. Demand for she stuff was good, one load of prime heifers bringing \$6, which was about 35 cents over last week's market. Good cows brought \$5.50, while ordinary kinds brought \$4.75 to \$5. Bulls were in good demand at 25 cents higher prices. There were no prime heavy bulls offered for trade. Fair to good bulls brought \$4 to \$4.25. There were a number of loads of feeders, although demand was rather light. Prices, in sympathy with beef cattle, advanced 25 cents, with a few feeders going at \$5.75.
Hogs—There was a liberal supply of good hogs here Monday, one of the best runs for some time. One load of choice butchers brought \$9.80, with several other loads of prime stuff to packers going at \$9.60. There was a good demand from all packers and butchers and offerings all sold early.
Sheep—There is practically no change in the sheep trade. One load of choice east of the mountain lambs brought \$8.75 today, with a number of loads of valley lambs at \$8.50. Valley yearlings brought \$7.50; good mutton ewes at \$5.55. A very good demand continues for all kinds of sheep.
