Chief Porter got wind of his bootlegging operations before he had been in the city more than a day or two. Two men were sent down to buy booze with marked money. Spencer accommodated them, charging two dollars for a "short quart," or onefifth gallon, and three dollars for a full quart. He sold whiskey from Warren's saloon at Hilt and from all appearances good quality stuff, although the chief has not allowed any tests as to its taste.
