Supervisor Erickson Tuesday received the following information about the proposed regiment from G. H. Cecil of Portland. the district forester:

> "A regiment of men for immediate service in France will be organized by the forest service under the direction of the war department. This regiment is planned to assist in forest work in France, and will also conduct logging and milling operations. Portable mills probably will be used as they can be quickly taken from place to place as need develops or as supply of logs requires. The regiment will be comprised of foresters, logging engineers, experienced woodsmen, loggers, and men of similar experience and training. This body of men will form a unit of the engineers' corps of which the railroad workers are a part.

The names of more than 1000 Erigene voters were attached to the potition asking that the law be stayed. These were taken to Portland by W. R. Rutherford, city school superintendent. They, along with those from Portland and many other parts of the state, were in the office of Attorney Veatch Saturday evening when Mr. Veatch went out for dinner. When he returned several copies of the petition were gone. The result was that petitions bearing the names of 14.000 legal voters could not be filed at Salem Saturday night, although Secretary of State Ben Olcott was at his office until nearly midnight.

"The count Saturday evening showed that we had a few more than the required 14,000 necessary names to keep the measure from going into effect," said Supterintendent Ruther+ ford, who returned to Eugene yesterday. "But when several copies of the names were stolen nothing further could be done."-Eugene Register.


Will Dedicate Church Addition
