they held a conference with Fred Cooper, superintendent of the city lines of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. It was one of the concessions they asked the company to grant and the company gave its consent.

C. C. Chapman of Portland Tuesday filed with Secretary of State Olcott a statement showing that the statewide good roads committee spent \$5,000 in the recent campaign for the \$6,000,000 road bond issue. The money was obtained from 255 contributors, the largest contributor being \$1,000 from the Benson Hotel, Portland.

Lake County Examiner: G. V. Poe, a homesteader of Paisley, was in Lakeview the first of the week and reports that Wayne Withers, a stockman and rancher of that section, waded 125 per cent lambing out of about 300 ewes. Mr. Poe assisted during the lambing. All the ewes were kept under shelter, which accounts for the remarkable results. This is an excellent argument for the construction of proper lambing sheds by the various sheepmen of the county. It would mean a great saving of sheep.

State Forester F. A. Elliott has placed 23 deputy state fire wardens in the field in connection with this season's forest fire prevention. These men will have supervision of the forest fire patrol work to be carried out through the forest area of the state. The patrolmen will be employed chiefly by the Forest Patrol Association, but they will be under the direction of the deputy state fire wardens. No fires of consequence have been reported this season. The closed season for fires began June 1 and those who want to burn slashings must first obtain a permit.

Polk County Observer: It is practically a foregone conclusion that the Oregon Hop Growers' Association will be dissolved and the members comprising it shift for themselves in the future. This was the sentiment at the meeting held in the Salem Commercial Club auditorium Thursday afternoon when a number of the members met to discuss the situation. When the association was organized in 1915 it had 700 members. This afternoon there were scarcely a handful present. In fact there was not a quorum present, and the meeting developed into an informal talkfest in which the members aired grievances.

Pushed by two gangs of laborers, numbering 130 in all, the 13-mile section of new road down the Illinois river is now all completed with the exception of a gap of about a mile and a half. Hence but a few weeks will elapse before the trucks will be hauling ore from the big chrome properties being opened up in this district.

Eugene Register: Khaki cloth for the soldiers of Uncle Sam's army is being manufactured in Eugene. The Eugene Woolen Mills Company has an order for 25,000 yards of the

oil, First Sergeant Woodley Stephenson, Sergeant Archie Milligan and first class privates Herbert and Ralph Quine, left last night for Portland, where they were mustered into the federal service at 9 o'clock this morning. According to the orders which were received here a short time before the departure the men will not receive their final instructions until after arriving at Portland, but it is understood the government has planned an extensive training school at the Kansas fort, where hundreds of members of the medical department will be trained for service in the field.

Eugene Register: That there are very few "slackers" in the state who did not register at the war census is the opinion of G. E. Jackson, deputy United States marshal, who was in Eugene yesterday on his way home from a trip to the Siuslaw country, where he arrested C. H. Watt, a homesteader, charged with setting fire to timber. "When I left Portland Saturday only 15 had been reported at the office of the United States marshal," said Deputy Jackson. "This shows that the young men of the state are patriotic. I do not believe that there are so many more than this who did not register, although, of course, we expect to pick up one here and there."

A "Sideral Day"

In answering a correspondent who asked the meaning of the term "sideral time" the Irish Times explains that that is the only truly scientific manner of recording time and is that which astronomers and navigators use. A "sideral day" is the precise time taken by the earth in revolving on its axis and is twenty-three hours, fifty-six minutes and four seconds. Our sundials, however, record a very different day.

If you set up a sundial in a garden and observe when it is noon today and again tomorrow you will find that it exceeds the "sideral day" by three minutes and fifty-six seconds. The difference is due to the distance that the earth has traveled on its orbit while it has been revolving on its axis. The orbit motion makes it necessary for the earth to turn nearly four minutes longer in order to bring any place to the same position with regard to the sun that it had on the previous day.

The Novice's Mistake.

In "Tales of the Flying Ship" C. G. Grey tells about a strange entry in the official report of an officer who had recently joined the service and was sent to pass a seaplane through a test for the English navy. He had to go up as a passenger with the constructor's pilot and to keep a log of what occurred during the test.

This is what he put down: "9:05 a. m. left ship; 9:10 a. m. altimeter shows 200 feet above sea; 9:12 a. m. curious phenomenon. Met a seagull flying backward!"

That meant that the machine, flying at the rate of about eighty miles an hour, overtook a seagull—which is not a fast flyer—going at about forty miles an hour, and that up in the air, without any background to give a proper sense of direction, the bird looked as if it were flying toward them last first. Probably the officer knows better now.
