County Doubles Red Cross Allotment

Jackson county has raised approximately \$30,000 for the National Red Cross fund, double the allotted amount. This amount has been reported in sight and will probably be exceeded when reports are all in.

Jackson county north has subscribed approximately \$20,000, of which Medford furnished \$14,000 and the small towns and country \$6,000. The allotted portion was \$10,000. The Ashland district, comprising from Phoenix south, has subscribed approximately \$10,500, which was double the allotment. It will be some time before the exact total can be ascertained.

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GOLD HILL ITEMS.

Leigh Hunt of the Hunt Engineering & Construction Company, with headquarters at Kansas City, Mo., has been commissioned a captain of a United States engineer corps, and his son Linfield, aged 15 years, has entered Annapolis, having passed with honors. Mr. Hunt and his associates have constructed nearly all the cement plants erected in the United States and Canada for the past few years, including the plant at Gold Hill and the one under construction at the present time at San Juan, Cal. The Hunts lived in Gold Hill two seasons while the plant was under construction, and their three children attended the Gold Hill schools. The home is in Kansas City, Mo.

Placide Bouchet, the venerable old tailor of Gold Hill, passed away at the Gold Hill hospital last Friday evening after an illness of several weeks. A severe attack of la grippe and the infirmities of old age were his destroyers. The deceased was born on June 21, 1844, in Bussy, France. He left his native land forty years ago and settled with his family at Wellington, Ontario, Canada, and resided there until about a decade ago, when he followed one of his sons to Condon, Oregon, and in the year 1909 located with his son, Ernest Bouchet, in Gold Hill, where he has since resided. His wife passed away some years ago. He leaves five sons and a daughter to mourn his loss, who were all at his bedside when the end came. The family consisted of Leon Bouchet, engaged in the grocery business in Portland; Victor Bouchet, a railroad signal foreman in Portland; Norman Bouchet, a dentist located in Portland; Herman Bouchet, a member of Company F, 13th U. S. Infantry; Ernest Bouchet, formerly of Gold Hill, now located at Deer Lodge, Mont., a railroad foreman, and Miss Eugenia Bouchet, a teacher in the Portland schools. The remains of the deceased were consigned to the Portland crematory Saturday morning, followed by the mourning relatives. The old Frenchman was beloved by all the residents of Gold Hill. His simple, patriotic life was a model to both the young and old. His kindness to his friends and neighbors knew no bounds. He would deprive himself of the necessities of life to relieve the wants of a needy or appealing neighbor. His first duty was to his adopted country, which he advocated in the most tense terms in speaking of the mighty conflict now raging and which the United States is now entering into. His logic and praise of this country's great work in humanity and in freeing Europe of the scourge of militarism bespoke knowledge of the great system. God bless the old patriot, and that he may inherit his reward in the great beyond is the prayer of his many Gold Hill friends.

Movie Matters

It is estimated that \$5,000,000 will be added to the expenditures of the film industry in Los Angeles this year. Those in a position to know believe the war will increase the demand for motion pictures rather than decrease it and are preparing accordingly. At the present time the film concerns and their affiliated industries are spending \$30,000,000 annually in Los Angeles. New companies are appearing almost every week and are increasing this amount. During the past year nearly \$2,000,000 was spent in new studios and in addition to the old ones. Before the end of the year it is believed a similar amount will have been spent in further construction. At the beginning of the year there were about forty-six companies operating in the Los Angeles territory. While the actual number of companies may at this time be less, this is because many of them have been units in mergers which have really increased the general output. The payroll of these film companies outstrips that of any two other industries in southern California.

Upon completion of her newest Artcraft picture, "The Little American," Mary Pickford will take a brief vacation before starting to work on "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm." The next picture will be produced under the direction of Marshall Neilan, who has attracted wide attention as a result of his unusual capabilities. Miss Pickford's work in "The Little American" is proving the most strenuous she ever experienced. One day recently she spent from 4 in the afternoon until 10 at night on a trail raft in the ocean off San Pedro in an evening gown, during which time she was compelled to go into the water continually. "Little Mary" accordingly feels that she is entitled to a rest and will spend a few weeks in the California mountains.

Charles Ray is to be starred in "The Clodhopper," a new Triangle-Ince play. He is said to have a role equally as good as in "The Pinch Hitter." Marjorie Wilson is co-starred with Ray in this production.

Syd Chaplin, brother of Charlie, has left New York after announcing positively that the next series of Chaplin pictures will be made by Charlie's own company. It is said that he refused a \$1,250,000 contract offered by Mutual for a year's work, but that this was refused, although his pictures may be released through Mutual.

Charles Ray has resigned from the Triangle, his contract being similar to those of Douglas Fairbanks with David Griffith and William S. Hart with Thomas H. Ince, whose pictures will probably appear on other than Triangle banner.

Thomas H. Ince sold his Triangle interests for \$750,000. The question is: Did that include the contract with Big Bill Hart? Ince says "No." Triangle says "Yes."
