Trained Engineers In Eager Demand

How much greater than the supply is the present demand for trained engineers, is explained by Professor McCullough as follows:

"Europe is calling for 10,000 trained American engineers to meet the present military situation, and will no doubt need many times this number.

"Not only during the present war but during the long period of reconstruction following it, engineers and engineering talent will be in greater demand than ever before in the history of nations—that upon American engineers will in large measure devolve the task of rebuilding devastated Europe.

"And so great is the need for American engineering talent in Europe that the great universities there are offering, as an inducement to American engineering graduates, \$1,000 scholarships for further study and research.

"Thus at the Oregon Agricultural College, alone, the demand this spring for graduates to fill engineering positions exceeded the available supply by two to three hundred per cent.

"Our nation's industrial activities are now thrown entirely on their own resources. Without the aid we have received heretofore from scientific Europe, the nation is now forced to look to her own engineers for the solution of her manifold industrial problems. Cost reduction methods, efficiency engineering, scientific investigation and research, these are the activities which are creating a demand for the services of the engineer.

"The field of munition manufacture, the conversion of our water-power resources into electrical energy, the reclamation of our lands for agricultural purposes, the electrification of our railway facilities, the sanitation of our newly established industrial sites, these are but few of the many opportunities for engineering activity in civil life.

"So much for the general opportunities. How about the salaries? You have a perfect right to know, for although financial returns are perhaps of secondary importance, they are important. As answering this query the American Society of Civil Engineers has recently made a careful investigation of salaries paid engineers and reported salaries ranging from \$600 to \$150,000 a year with an advance of \$4,032. This investigation includes 6,378 engineers. In commenting upon the figures the society committee states that the compensation for engineering work compares favorably with that received by men of any other profession."

Oregon's Part.

Eugene Guard: Every one knows that one of the stars in the American flag represents Oregon, but few, and very few at that, know which one belongs to us. Every state in the Union has its own individual and particular star and its placement on the square of blue definitely regulated by law and executive order.

Oregon can easily be located on the flag—the fifth star down the left hand side. In 1912, on the 26th day of October, the last executive order concerning the flag was made and it provided for the specific arrangement of the stars. They were to be arranged in six horizontal rows of eight stars each. Starting in the upper left hand corner and placing each row from left to right, the star corresponding to each state is named in the order of the state's ratification of the constitution.

Thus star No. 1, in the upper left hand corner, is for Delaware. Star No. 48, in the lower right hand corner, is for Arizona.

The Wettest City in the World.

"It is a remarkable fact that in India, one of the most arid countries in the world, there is one spot that has the record rainfall of the whole earth," said Dr. William Roberts, British agricultural expert in India, to a correspondent of the Washington Post. "This place is Cherapunji, in Assam. It is in the path of the monsoon and in a valley, and there is almost constant rainfall. The average rainfall is 600 inches a year, or fifty feet, which is nearly a foot a week."
