Many Fires Rage
Throughout State

There have been more forest fires in the state of Oregon during the past week than the state has ever witnessed before. In many places the fires have assumed alarming proportions and the losses have been heavy. Many of the fires in different parts of the state are believed to have been started by I. W. W. or other German sympathizers and for this reason the state authorities made a request for federal troops to be dispatched to the scenes of the outrages for the purpose of patrolling the country. It is reported that this request has been granted and that several companies of men had been sent to different parts of the state, however, Adjutant-General White in a later report says it would be preposterous to remove the troops from their training camps when the United States is engaged in war, for the purpose of doing work that is essentially a citizens work and work which citizens have done in the past years.

It is understood, however, that several detachments of expert riflemen have been sent to guard the country where it is absolutely certain that the fires have been of incendiary origin.

The first loss of life in the fires was reported from Clatsop county.

Two Bulgarians fighting fires near Knappa were burned to death Saturday. Their bodies have been recovered.

Coos county was isolated recently. Fires had destroyed all wires leading to that district. Repairs are in progress.

At Hood River it was impossible to see across to the Washington shore of the Columbia river because of the smoke.

Greatest damage in national forests was reported from the Minam, Deschutes and Cascade reserves, the first two in central Oregon and the third in the western portion of the state. In all of these reserves large bodies of green timber were reported burned.

A terrific forest has been raging in the Cow Creek canyon district, south of Roseburg, for the past few days and the telephone and telegraph service between here and Roseburg is badly crippled.

Raging forest fires have been reported in practically every county in the state during the past few weeks and in several sections of the state homes and sawmills have been destroyed, to say nothing of the incalculable loss of timber.

No bad forest fires have been reported in the near vicinity of Ashland during the past week although the city has been clothed in the most dense smoke blanket that old residents of the city have ever witnessed. For the past few days the smoke has been of a fog-like intensity which has shut off the sun and made the day seem almost as short as it is in the dead of winter.

There has been no evidence that the fires which ravaged the forests near here some few weeks ago were set by "fire bugs," which have been reported the cause of many of the fires in other parts of the state. A group of forest rangers and fire wardens are keeping a strict lookout for any signs of fires in this locality so that the timber will not be damaged as it was last month.
