FORMS. All proposals must be made upon blank form to be obtained from the County Clerk, at his office at the court house, Jacksonville, Oregon; must give the prices proposed, both in writing and figures; and must be signed by the bidder, with his address.

BIDDER'S BOND. Each bid is to be presented under sealed cover, and shall be accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond payable to County Treasurer, Jackson County, or a certified check made payable to the County Clerk of said County, for an amount equal to at least five per cent of the amount of the said bid, and no bid shall be considered unless such cash, bond or check is enclosed therewith. Such bidder's bond shall be conditioned that if said bid is accepted, the party bidding will duly enter into and execute the contract. Should the successful bidder to whom the contract is awarded fail to execute the same within ten days (not including Sunday) from the date of the mailing of the notice from the County Court to him, according to the address therewith given, that the contract is ready for signature such cash, bond or certified checks shall be forfeited to Jackson County, and the same shall be the property of the county. Red Cross Activities

Oregon's Base Hospital.

Efforts are being made to rush the subscription of funds for equipping the University of Oregon's medical base hospital. Previous hospital and ambulance units from Oregon have been of the small, mobile type, belonging to the field service, and these have been supplied by the government. But the heavier and more elaborate equipment of the base hospital units has been furnished in every case by Red Cross chapters and individual donations, and the equipment of the Oregon unit will be supplied in the same way. Hood River has given \$500 towards this fund, while Portland chapter of the Red Cross has set aside \$20,000 for this purpose, and these records are being matched by other chapters throughout the state. Telegrams from Washington are urging all possible speed, because of the increasing need in the service.

What is a Base Hospital?

In view of the campaign for Oregon's base hospital, mentioned just above, it may be of interest to know that a base hospital is an organization of 500 beds, each bed costing \$50. An idea of the importance and magnitude of the base hospital is gained when one realizes that it is as large as the Good Samaritan and St. Vincent's in Portland combined.

More Nurses Needed.

Though the response to the call for duty with the University of Oregon base hospital has been splendid, many more nurses are needed, especially for the emergency service in the cantonment hospitals with army nurse corps.

Other Helpers Needed in a Base Hospital.

Men other than doctors are employed in a base hospital under three classes: in the field column as litter bearers and chauffeurs; on the hospital floor proper as pharmacists, clerks, cooks, waiters, stenographers, ward orderlies, porters and mechanics; and in the supply department as pharmacists, shipping clerks, packers and chauffeurs. Women other than nurses may apply for enrollment in a base hospital in the following lines of work: Linen room work, preparation and serving of special diets, supply room service, disinfection, cleaning and mending, care of patients' clothing, and ward work as nurses' aid. For those women wishing to apply for service in any of these capacities a special course of instruction under the Red Cross will be required. Anyone, either man or woman, desiring to volunteer for work along any of these lines should apply to the secretary of the local chapter.

A Novel Red Cross Benefit.

Wells a small town in southern Minnesota, with less than two thousand inhabitants, recently netted \$570 for the Red Cross by giving an "Indoor Carnival." The school house and grounds were used for staging the event. Each school room on the first floor was converted into a booth of some sort, a flower booth, a carnival novelty booth, etc.; while the school rooms on the second floor were occupied by side shows of various kinds. In one, profusely decorated with cherry blossoms, there was a Japanese performance; in another, there was an exhibition of folk dances; in another, a display of waxworks; while the assembly hall was turned over to the vaudeville artists. Cafeteria supper was served on the lawn by the women of the various churches. Criers, "spielers" and fortune tellers enlivened the scene, and the school house itself, as befitted the center of attractions, was gorgeous, both inside and out, with flags, bunting and flowers.

Musician Does His Bit.

Lawrence Woodfin, a well-known musician of Portland, has just returned from the beaches of Oregon, where he has been giving concerts, the proceeds of which, amounting to \$1,000, will be turned over to the Red Cross.

Convention Will Discuss Tuberculosis

Alarmed by war's destruction through tuberculosis as well as bullets, delegates from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Utah have been called into conference at Portland, October 15 and 16.

It will be the first conference of the kind ever held in the northwest. The first consideration will be means of checking the ravages of the disease in trenches and army camps and at home. Participation of the public in an elaborate campaign as a measure of vital war service will be considered.

On Monday, October 15, there will be a series of reports and analysis on "Diagnosis of Tuberculosis in War Time." Answer will be sought to the difficult question, "what constitutes a diagnosis of tuberculosis sufficient for rejection from the army?"

The statistics of tuberculosis as a war problem will be presented at the Monday afternoon session of the Northwestern Tuberculosis conference as well as the importance of the Red Cross seals in anti-tuberculosis crusades. The Monday evening session will be a mass meeting, its subject, "Tuberculosis in a Nation at War" with addresses from the best informed men in the country, and illustrative motion pictures and music.

The war programs against tuberculosis, both national and state, will be reviewed at the sessions. Tuesday, October 16, Educational methods best adapted to aid in carrying on the work of preventing the disease will be discussed and analyzed and war programs for local work will be formulated along the lines of education, hospital and sanatorium provision, dispensaries and clinics, open air schools, getting related groups to work, nursing, Red Cross seals and other methods of financing and organization.

While not in any sense showy, the convention, it is said, will be one of the most important ever held in the Pacific northwest.
