Gold Hill Buys Power Site

The city of Gold Hill has purchased the McClure power site, water right and ditches for power purposes in operating the city water plant. The franchise with the local power plant for operating the city water system expires next year, and the city contemplates installing an entire new system before that time, which will be operated as a municipal plant. Bonds in the sum of \$25,000 were voted at a regular election three years ago for that purpose. The new purchase is an old water right that has been used for a number of years in operating a ten-stamp quartz mill opposite the city on Rogue river. The water is taken from the river three miles above Gold Hill and is conducted in an open ditch to the power site with a 25-foot drop to the river.

The number of pupils now enrolled in Ashland high numbers 174. Of these, 116 are girls and 58 are boys. The senior class nearly has its full quota as compared to last year's junior class. The freshmen class stands next in line as to number of members.
