Government Crop Report

Washington, D. C., Sept. 7.—A summary of the September crop report for the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and for the United States, as compiled by the Bureau of Crop Estimates (and transmitted through the Weather Bureau), U. S. Department of Agriculture, is as follows:

Crops.
Winter wheat, bushels, preliminary estimate: Oregon 8,400,000, Washington 10,900,000, Idaho 5,910,000, United States 41,347,000. Production last year, December estimate: Oregon 13,340,000, Washington 18,280,000, Idaho 8,256,000, United States 481,744,000.

Spring wheat, bushels, September 1 forecast: Oregon 4,170,000, Washington 26,600,000, Idaho 7,630,000, United States 250,000,000. Production last year, December estimate: Oregon 6,210,000, Washington 19,350,000, Idaho 6,815,000, United States 158,142,000.

Oats, bushels, September 1 forecast: Oregon 10,600,000, Washington 10,600,000, Idaho 12,100,000, United States 1,530,000,000. Production last year, December estimate: Oregon 17,280,000, Washington 14,300,000, Idaho 13,330,000, United States 1,251,992,000.

Barley, bushels, September 1 forecast: Oregon 4,700,000, Washington 5,010,000, Idaho 5,910,000, United States 204,000,000. Production last year, December estimate: Oregon 5,290,000, Washington 6,814,000, Idaho 7,410,000, United States 180,927,000.

Potatoes, bushels, September 1 forecast: Oregon 5,540,000, Washington 9,400,000, Idaho 6,280,000, United States 462,000,000. Production last year, December estimate: Oregon 8,250,000, Washington 9,900,000, Idaho 4,050,000, United States 285,437,000.

All hay, tons, preliminary estimate: Oregon 1,810,000, Washington 1,810,000, Idaho 2,340,000, United States 109,786,000.

Apples, agricultural crop, barrels of three bushels: September 1 forecast, Oregon 1,10,000, Idaho 697,000, United States 59,100,000. Production last year, December estimate, Oregon 1,285,000, Idaho 147,000, United States 67,415,000.

Apples, bushels, commercial crop. September 1 forecast: Washington 10,750,000, United States 63,900,000. Production last year, December estimate: Washington 10,400, United States 77,100,000.

Forests Help Increase Our Meat Supply

Approximately 19,000 more cattle and 29,500 more sheep are being grazed this season on the national forests of Oregon and Washington than in ordinary years, according to District Forester G. H. Ceell. The extra demand for meat occasioned by war conditions is given as the reason for this increased use of the ranges. The national forests of the country are carrying about 100,000 more cattle and 200,000 more sheep than usual. Ordinarily the national forests furnish pasturage for about 1,800,000 cattle and horses and 7,800,000 head of sheep.

The number of livestock permitted on the forests is limited in order to prevent damage to timber growth, water supplies and the range itself. This year exceptional weather conditions combined with the general food situation to create an unusual emergency, calling for special provisions to take care of the stock. A severe winter and late spring exhausted the hay supply and forced use of the spring ranges before they had reached their normal state. To lessen the losses which the western livestock industry faced, the national forest ranges were opened early. At the same time the number of stock permitted for the present season was raised to the maximum consistent with safeguarding future productivity.

It is fully recognized that the increases which have been made in the allowances of stock on the national forests involve danger that the range will be depleted through overgrazing, but it is believed by the grazing experts of the government that the emergency increases made can be taken care of at least this year, without material sacrifice of productive capacity. The condition of the ranges is, however, being carefully watched. Reliance is placed also on the special efforts being made to secure the most intensive utilization consistent with sustained productivity, by improved methods of handling the stock. Better methods and the development of new watering places are among the means employed for this purpose.

At the close of the grazing season a careful examination will be made

of the range on each forest to determine its condition and to find out how many cattle or sheep it will support next season. On areas which are found to be overgrazed, an attempt will be made to shift the surplus stock to range which can stand the strain better.

While the grazing officials do not think that the increase could be carried indefinitely without serious damage to the forage, regulated grazing has brought about a steady improvement of the range and some areas will probably be able to support the larger number permanently.

The fair management especially needs displays of fine potatoes, onions and squash. D. M. Lowe is classifying and arranging the exhibits and as a result Jackson county will forward its finest display ever sent to the state fair at Salem, where three times the customary space has been allotted to it. The initial display of these exhibits will be at Medford.
