A runaway freight car which got away from its handlers in the freight yards at Ashland Thursday evening created much excitement all the way from Ashland to Gold Hill, but fortunately caused no damage.

Hardly had the runaway left Ashland before word was telegraphed to all stations north along the railroad to look for it. The telegram first reached Medford in time for the depot attaches here to hurry out three guards to the Main street crossing to hold back vehicles and pedestrians and to get the switch engine from the main track onto a sidetrack when the car came thundering through the city at a speed of 30 miles an hour.

Its speed was greatly decreased in going up the Tolo hill, and at Gold Hill it gracefully rolled in through an opened switch onto a sidetrack, and the danger and excitement were over.

The three special guards who held back autos and pedestrians at the Main street crossing had a rather unpleasant time of it, as, because the drivers and others could see no coming headlights of a train, or see anything approaching, they insisted on wanting to cross the tracks.—Mail Tribune.

Gold Hill Notes

Captain E. B. Day of Sams valley and of the Gold Hill home guards has leased his farm known as the old Moon place, in Sams valley, to Roy Green of Gold Hill, and left last week for Lebanon, Ore. They went with their auto with the intention of permanently locating at that place, but possibly may extend their trip to he east.

F. R. Burger of Medford, the representative of the Rogue River Fruit and Produce Association, arrived the first of the week to arrange for the packing and shipping of the apple crop in the Gold Hill district. The large warehouses of J. F. Morrill's and Truax's on the siding are being remodeled and equipped with electric light for a crew of 16 packers and storage purposes in the event of car shortage. Mr. Burger estimates that there will be 20,000 boxes shipped from this district through the association. He has engaged all experienced packers in Gold Hill, excepting two brought from Medford. The association will make three grades in shipping from this point: Triangle brand (blue label), Triangle brand (red label) and Grade C. They are handling fruit from the following orchards: Lyman & Houston, J. F. Morrill, O. E. Blackington, H. Van Hovenburg, Roy Green and Ray Stoner. Packing will commence October 16.

When the Calf is Born.

Farm and Fireside says: "A few simple rules observed before and after birth will eliminate danger either to the cow or her offspring. The feeding of some concentrates—cottonseed meal, bran or linseed meal—a few weeks before the cow is due to freshen is helpful both to the mother and her offspring. Dry feeding probably has clogged the eliminative organs—the bowels, the kidneys and the skin.

"To a great extent these concentrated feeds will correct this condition. Cottonseed meal should not be given to those cows that are exceptionally heavy milkers, because it increases the flow of milk and might cause milk fever. It is a good plan to give to heavy milkers a medium to small dose of Epsom salts—eight to twelve ounces dissolved in water—two to three days apart, just before the cow is expected to freshen. This will help keep down the congestion. Exposure to cold, rains and strong winds has the effect of driving the

blood of the animal from the surface to the internal organs, which frequently results in disease of various kinds.

"The cow should be isolated a few days before the calf is expected. This will prevent any possible injury or worry either to her or her offspring."

The Commonwealth Lumber Company of Portland has purchased between 12,000,000 and 15,000,000 feet of timber in the vicinity of Nekoma, a station on the Coos Bay line of the Southern Pacific railroad system, and has started work on the erection of a sawmill which will have a capacity of from 40,000 to 50,000 feet of lumber daily. Options on other timber in that region have been obtained by the company.

Mrs. D. H. Miller of Gold Hill is at the Sacred Heart hospital and an unknown man and boy are nursing injuries received last night when the Grants Pass jitney collided with a buggy between this city and Central Point. The jitney and the buggy are reported to have been almost demolished. The driver of the auto bus told the police that lights from an approaching machine blinded him and made the collision unavoidable. He was arrested on a charge of reckless driving.—Medford Sun.
