Shower for Bride.



Sugar Hoarding Must Be Stopped

Individual selfishness and lack of patriotism are threatening, in various parts of the country, Oregon not excepted, to undo the splendid work of the United States Food Administration in regulating the prices of staple foods and preventing profiteering by wholesale and retail grocers. Reports are being made to the office of W. B. Ayer, federal food administrator for Oregon, that private individuals have been buying and hoarding certain staples, notably sugar, beyond all their reasonable needs.

"The person who does this," said Assistant Federal Food Administrator W. K. Newell, "is very shortsighted, as well as entirely selfish and unpatriotic.
