North Bend—South Slough macadam road work progresses.

Klamath Falls—Ten farmers of Klamath county are to water 1,720 acres.

North Bend—Southern Pacific gets new 65-year franchise. Spur tracks for North Bend Mill & Lumber Co. and Kruse & Banks' shipyard are provided for.

Harrisburg—New cheese factory begins operation.

Roseburg—O. & S. timber to be sold by the government.

McMinnville may have a cannery.

St. Johns is to have a plant for installation of machinery in vessels.

Corvallis—Southern Pacific station is to be moved.

Dolph is to have a new cheese factory.

Silver Lake—School building is being improved.

Lane—Hull shingle mill will build logging railroad.

Springfield—Work on road between here and Morris ranch is nearing completion.

Vale—Harney and Malheur county wool clip for 1917, estimated at 2,000,000 pounds, at an average of 50 cents makes the value of the crop \$1,000,000.

Marshfield—Elk River creamery is being rebuilt at a cost of \$3,000.

Hood River—Two bridges across Hood river are near completion.

Cost, \$6,000 each.

Marshfield—Coos Bay Ship Building Company is laying the keel for

the first of eight government vessels.

Marshfield—The Buehner Lumber Company is to start construction of planer sheds about 800 feet long and dry kilns about 300 feet long. Fifty more men are to be employed in the new departments.

Reedsport—New hotel may be built here next spring.

Helix—Contract work on Helix mill has begun.

HOW CAN WE BEST SERVE ITS TRUE INTERESTS?

An eastern publishing house got out recently a decorative card setting forth the titles of the national airs of the allies now united, as it were, under a single liberty flag and determined, at whatever cost, to encompass the destruction of a power bent upon the domination of the world and the annihilation of inoffensive and liberty-loving smaller communities who, principally through the protecting hand of Great Britain, have been able to retain, without let or hindrance, their places on the map of Europe and other parts of our terrestrial abode. "My Country, 'Tis of Thee" and the "Star-Spangled Banner" are made to represent Uncle Sam and his national domain. It is curious to observe the make-up both in verse and music of these several national creations, and in our own case, in the estimation of many critics—sound to the core in their patriotism for the Stars and Stripes—there is a disposition to regard the "Star-Spangled Banner" as well as "Yankee Doodle" as being wedded to mediocre music and, when this "weary war" is over, steps are likely to be taken for the donning of brand new versical and musical attire, or the substitution of an entirely new

national anthem. It has long been conceded that while the melody itself in "Star-Spangled Banner" is very far from being repellant, the intervals lay, in such disjointed and abrupt positions as to preclude the possibility of "dressing it up" in anything approaching rich and inspiring harmonies.

With this much said incidentally, let me pass directly to the subject of my talk. "My Country, 'Tis of Thee" suggests a wide scope for the consideration of the vast interests of our republic, which, starting in colonial days with a mere handful of people, now overtops the mark of a hundred million of sane, liberty-loving people drawn from nearly every nation under heaven. Our nation, at this time, has had thrust upon it, in conjunction with its allies, the tremendous task of fighting, to a finish, perhaps the cruellest and most piratical piece of militarism that the world has ever witnessed, the entire situation needing the combined strength and heroic endeavor of many nations to wipe off the face of the earth an affliction that has brought so much of sorrow and UNDESERVED suf-

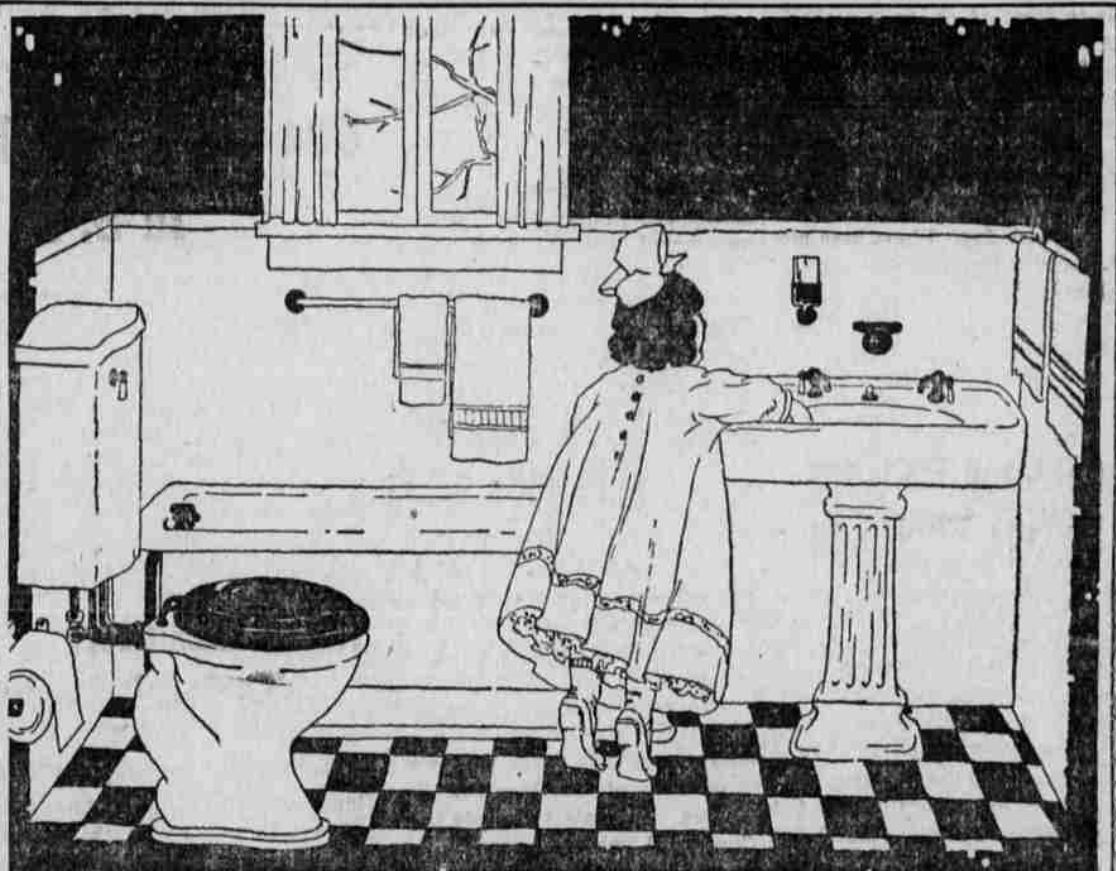
